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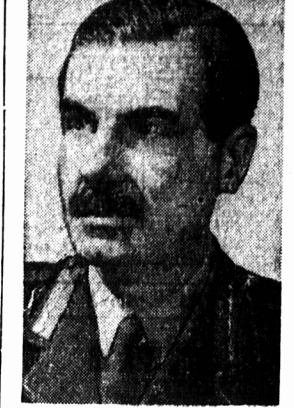

Addresses Meeting Of Engineering Institute

A warm tribute to the ability and hospitality of the engineers of Great Britain on their work on the Coronation was paid last night by Mr. R. L. Dobbin, M.E.I.C., president of the E.I.C. of Canada, as he addressed the annual meeting of the P.E.I. branch of the Engineering Institute at a dinner meeting held at the Queen Hotel last night.

Mr. Dobbin himself is the son of the late Mr. Francis H. Dobbin, former president of the Canadian Newspaper Association, owner and operator of the Peterborough Review, and author of the well known "Our Old Home Town".

He told last night's gathering that during his trip to the Coronation he had the pleasure of meeting a great many English engineers and during the ceremony itself, as a representative of the Institute, he had enjoyed the privilege of a place in Westminster Abbey.

Mr. Dobbin related several home-ly tales of incidents during the ceremony, one of which concerned the unexpected cleaning of the carpets which he likened to "cleaning the ice at Maple Leaf Gardens between periods".

He thought the lighting job done by British engineers for the big show must have been a tremendous job and believed that this illustrated the great ability of the British in organization.

Of Princess Margaret he recalled that she had those "big gray eyes" such as a pretty Canadian girl would love to have.

Of business matters he stated that although Britain was not selling much to Canada at present she has succeeded in capturing a large part of the world's markets.
