

# New Experiments Set For Next Orbital Try

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP)—Leon, handsome Macdonald Scott Carpenter soon will embark on a journey such as has been experienced by only three men—a orbital ride more than 100 miles above the earth. If the present schedule holds, Carpenter, outfitted in a silver space suit, will ride an elevator to the 11th level of a red and white rocket service tower on Launch Pad 14 early next Saturday morning.

He will squeeze into a cramped space capsule—which he has named Aurora 7—and sometime between 8 a.m. and 1:30 p.m. EDT he will be shot into space by an Atlas missile.

Astronaut John H. Glenn Jr. took the same dramatic steps last Feb. 20. He circled the earth three times and became an American legend, embraced as a symbol of America's intention to be first to land a man on the moon.

Two other men have made orbital flights: Russians Yuri Gagarin and Gherman Titov, the latter circling the globe 17 times.

**TOOK CONTROLS**  
Near the end of Glenn's first orbit, the automatic control system in his capsule malfunctioned slightly. This caused the capsule to drift off the planned orbit. Glenn took over manual control during the last two orbits.

Carpenter will try experiments Glenn was unable to carry out because he was busy with the manual controls.

But about half of his flight is planned to be automatic and half manually directed. At times, Aurora 7 will be permitted to drift off its intended attitude course to determine what happens to communications.

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## Yanks Described As Weaklings

SYDNEY, Australia (Reuters) Americans were described Saturday as a "race of weaklings and no-hopers" by Percy Ceruty, former coach of Herb Elliott, Australian 1,500-metre Olympic champion.

Ceruty was commenting to reporters on a U.S. Amateur Athletic Union report which suggested athletes between 25 and 45 should have the same standard of physical fitness as a 15-year-old.

Ceruty described the standard as "disgraceful."

"Any man of 45 should be able to run physical rings around a 15-year-old," he said. "I can run a mile under six minutes and I'm in my eighth year."

RICHMOND, Va. (AP)—Left-hander Ed Downing pitched the first no-hitter in Richmond's International League history Saturday night at the Virginia Golf and Country Club.

The rookie southpaw, who spent part of last season with the parent New York Yankees, lived up to his reputation by striking out 11 batters and struck out eight.

HALIFAX (CP)—Eight half-mile races officially opened the 1962 summer harness racing season at nearby Sackville Downs on Saturday.

Mrs. Andrew Moko's Royal Oxy, who closed off the Halifax Common purse racing season with the fastest time, continued in speedy form by pacing the half mile at Sackville Downs in 1:02, best time for the afternoon.

Halifax area winners included Margaret McKillop, Hi Thero, Royal Oxy and Sator Pindal. Others were Curbin, owned by Harold Walsh of Truro; Johnny Bars, owned by W.G. Shea of Pictou; Prince Jane C, owned by C. W. Lavers of Three Mile Plains, and Ruby Pride owned by Stan Mayhew of Kingsport, P.E.I.

Best combination return was \$109 on Sister Paul and Money Royal in the exactor eighth.

## Rumor Denied Of Volcano

MEXICO CITY (AP)— Authorities said Saturday there is no volcanic activity in the area. A volcanic eruption triggered an earthquake which rocked seven central Mexican states Friday, killing three persons and injuring at least 100 others.

Dr. Jose Merino Y Colorado of the Mexican Geophysical Institute said a search plane was unable to find any active volcano in an area 60 miles east of Acapulco where farmhands had reported water boiling in local streams, the result of volcanic activity.

## Rate Case Is Sent To Supreme Court

The preliminary hearing of Leo Austin MacLeod, Albany, charged with rape, was heard Saturday, May 12, with the accused sent up for trial before the Supreme Court, by Prince County Magistrate W. Chester S. Macdonald, after the evidence of 10 witnesses had been heard.

In the middle of proceedings, Magistrate Macdonald barred the public while the plaintiff, Mrs. Josephine Bernard, Albany, was testifying.

Crown prosecutor George R. MacMahon made the motion that press and public be barred for at least part of the case because this is not for the protection of the public, but to protect the witnesses'.

Mr. MacLeod had no lawyer, but he conducted his own defence and cross-examined several of the Crown's witnesses, including the plaintiff.

The crown prosecutor went on to say that the accused was a 35-year-old man who had been in the previous night.

At this stage, Magistrate Macdonald ordered the courtroom cleared, while Mrs. Bernard gave her evidence. This took the rest of the morning session and until about 2:30 Saturday afternoon.
