# Red Charges Heard As U.S. Opens Tests

GENEVA (AP) — The Soviet Union has charged the United States government's final decision to resume atmospheric explosions was proof that the U.S. and Britain never wanted an agreement to ban nuclear weapons tests.

Soviet Deputy Foreign Minister Valerian Zorin told the 17-nation disarmament conference the two Western powers were insincere in insisting on effective international test-ban controls.

The statement was made before government informants in Washington disclosed that the United States had fired its first shot of the new nuclear test series in the atmosphere over the central Pacific.

Western officials have repeatedly said the Soviet refusal to accept the Western inspection demand has forced President Kennedy and Prime Minister Macmillan to go ahead with the test explosions in order to protect Western military security.

"Everyone can now see that the United States and the United Kingdom were attempting to wash their hands, before the peoples of the world and shrug off the responsibility for the tests," Zorin declared.

The Soviet delegate threatened last week to lead a Communist walkout as soon as the tests begin. He did not repeat that threat.

Zorin expressed support for Prime Minister Nehru's recent appeal to all nuclear powers to refrain from all tests while the talks continue. India's appeal was formally submitted to the conference by Delegate Arthur Lal Wednesday morning.

Before U.S. Ambassador Arthur Dean had a chance to reply to the Indian move, Zorin went on to accuse the U.S. of ignoring all appeals and of "setting a course to further the arms race."

myko told the Supreme Soviet in Moscow Tuesday Russia would reply to Western testing with tests of its own.)

Conference sources said British Minister of State Joseph Godber rejected Zorin's outburst as "somewhat rude, to say the least."

Dean later assured the meeting the U.S. government will continue its effort to reach a test-ban agreement. But he said he was forced "with the greatest reluctance to respond that the United States cannot undertake another unpoliced moratorium" such as the one the Soviet Union abruptly broke last fall.

Conference sources said the eight middle-group nations refrained from denouncing the mid-Pacific tests.

Marshall said when the band played something else, Princess Anne sent up a request—for another twist. Charles also asked for a Charleston.

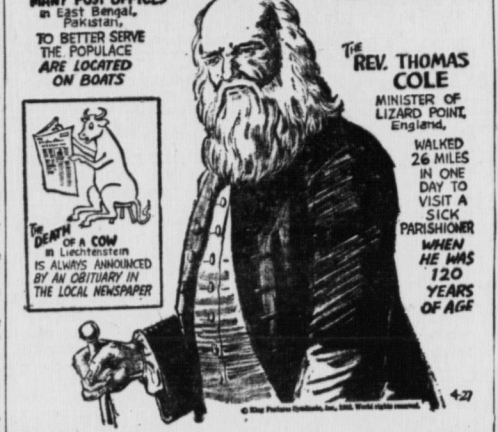

## CONTRACT BRIDGE

### TEST YOUR PLAY

1. You are declarer with the West hand at Three Notrump. North leads the six of spades and you win the king with the ace. How would you play the hand?

2. You are declarer with the West hand at Seven Diamonds. North leads the queen of clubs. How would you play the hand?

3. Obviously, the question is whether to attack hearts or diamonds first. The proper thing to do is play hearts at once to force out the ace. The diamond finesse is postponed until later.

The danger is that North has great spade length (let's say five of them) and the ace of hearts first, you knock out his entry and thus disarm him. Suppose he takes the ace of hearts
