

Proposed Program By CBC Touches Off Ottawa Furor

OTTAWA (CP)—A CBC television program that has not even been shown yet, has touched off a furor both inside and outside Parliament and prompted a rare government intervention in CBC programming.

The play, "The Open Grave," scheduled to be broadcast Wednesday night, was criticized by opposition MPs, and some clergymen as a sacrilegious insult to Christians.

State Secretary Lamontagne, who reports to Parliament on the CBC, said in the Commons he intends to discuss the program with CBC President Alphonse Ouellet before it is shown. His parliamentary secretary, John B. Stewart, said earlier the CBC considers the program suitable for the Easter season.

The play, written by Charles E. Israel and filmed in eight weeks at a cost of \$50,000, draws an analogy between the death and resurrection of Christ and the execution in modern-day Toronto of a hand-bomb leader "framed" for the murder of a Mounie.

Opposition leader Diefenbaker said he has not seen the video-taped show, but advance publicity indicated that it was a "flagrant, scandalous and sacrilegious insult to the majority of Canadians."

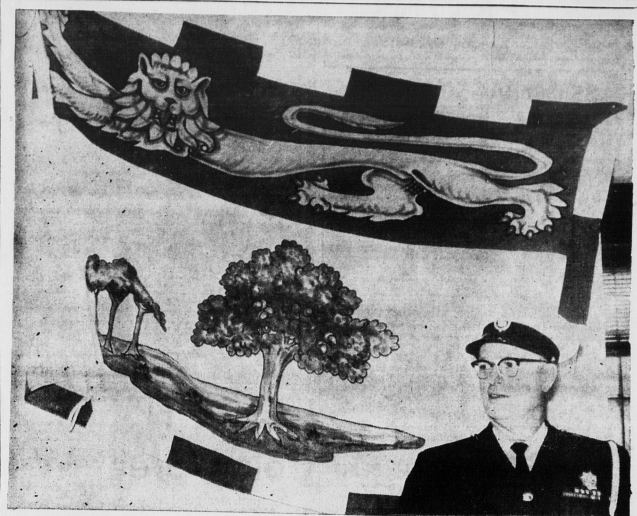

DURING the final session of the Legislature which was prorogued yesterday, the members gave unanimous approval to a bill giving Prince Edward Island a distinctive flag of its own, bearing the coat-of-arms in use since the reign of King Edward VII.

The official description of the arms is as follows: "argent on an island vert, the sinister an oak tree fructed, to the dexter three oak saplings sprouting all proper, on a chief gules a lion passant guardant or."

The act respecting a provincial flag sets out the dimensions and specifications of the flag which "may be flown on Provincial Government buildings or other buildings and by such institutions, bodies or persons unless otherwise provided by the Lieutenant-Governor in Council."

Provincial Flag Given Approval

A provincial flag for Prince Edward Island was given official recognition to carry the coat of arms of the province which has been in use since King Edward VII granted in the early part of the century.

Shortly after midnight yesterday, "An Act Respecting the Armorial Bearings of the Province of Prince Edward Island" and "An Act Respecting a Provincial Flag" were given second reading in the Legislature.

The bills were read quickly and consented to unanimously with the official passing due today.

Promoter of both bills, Provincial Secretary J. David Stewart said that "seven different designs of the armorial bearings" had been in use at one time. The Royal College of Arms in London, England, asked to send the correct design, reported that it had been destroyed during enemy bombing of London during World War II.

Yeast-Mold Is Blamed For Asthma

DENVER (CP)—A yeast-like mold that may be growing inside half the world's inhabitants has been found to cause asthma, an allergy specialist said.

Dr. Irving H. Ikin, head of allergy and asthma research at National Jewish Hospital, said in an interview that the mold, known as candida albicans, grows in any warm, moist area—and it is often found in a human's mouth or throat.

"Possibly half the human population carries it around," Ikin said.

The growth of the mold, Ikin added, is encouraged by the prolonged use of antibiotics and surgery in the body that make a person immune to certain diseases. Therefore, Ikin said, an organism not inhibited by the antibiotic tends to grow.

Ikin said also that the presence of the mold within one's body does not necessarily mean the person is susceptible to asthma. Only those who are allergic to the mold will probably get asthma.
