Opening lead—seven of hearts. The mathematics of bridge are such that a small slam should be undertaken whenever the chances of making the contract are better than even. If you bid and make a small slam, you gain about as many points as you would lose if the attempt failed. The vulnerability conditions have little bearing on whether or not to undertake a slam. If your chances of making the slam are in excess of 50 per cent, you should be that much more anxious to reach it; and if, in a given case, your prospects of making the slam are 100 per cent, it would surely be wrong not to arrive at six.

Runaway Wolf Shot

LONDON (CP)—A lean, hungry and exhausted Canadian timber wolf was cornered and shot Monday after a three-day hunt across the hills and dales of two English counties. The two-year-old wolf, on the loose since Friday from Whipsnade Zoo, about 35 miles north of London, was spotted from the air by the pilots of two RAF Chimpunk aircraft. Flying at tree-top level over copses and pastures described by a zoo official as "excellent wolf country"—the planes drove the runaway towards a band of armed police and zoo keepers. Finally the runaway was cornered in a thicket by a collie shepherd. As the hunters moved in for the kill, the pilots above suddenly spotted a group of 40 schoolchildren, most of them 12-year-olds, running pell-mell across the fields to where the wolf was hiding. The pilots radioed police and the children were headed off. Zoo marksman William Lilley wounded the animal with one shot from a 12-bore shotgun. The wolf collapsed, panting heavily, and was given the coup de grace with a .22-rifle bullet through the head.

Tiny Gambia To Become Independent

By LYNN HEINZERLING LONDON (AP)—Next Thursday Britain will close out the last sliver of its African empire between the Mediterranean and the Zambesi R'vier. With all the traditional fanfare and fireworks, the old colony of Gambia, with its 316,000 inhabitants, will become free and independent, a member of the Commonwealth and a candidate for a seat in the United Nations. With Gambia free, only four territories of Britain's once-empire holdings in Africa will be awaiting their liberation—Rhodesia, Bechuanaland, Swaziland and Basutoland, all at the southern end of the continent. Gambia is a slender finger of land and river almost surrounded by Senegal on the western bulge of Africa. Gambia is so small—4,000 square miles—and its economic base so fragile that there were serious doubts about its ability to survive. Gambia literally lives from peanuts, producing about 70,000 tons a year. They represent 90 per cent of the country's exports. Britain has agreed to give funds sufficient to cover any unbalanced budgets and finance a modest development program. Gambia's prime minister, David K. Jawara, admitting a future of toil and sacrifice, says he looks forward to "generous aid from outside."

The OECD report also advocated the adoption of an incomes policy as a device to deal with the strong pressure on costs and prices which arise when an economy such as Canada's approaches full employment.
