

In the United States the Democrats seem to be nothing daunted by the reverses they have sustained in Ohio and Indiana.

We think we may congratulate Mr. Murphy on his election.

Closely following in the wake of the Exhibition, we have had the first Teachers' Convention. The teachers have compared notes, read essays and heard speeches on the interesting and important subject of school work. The necessity of scrupulous honesty in the schools has been enforced. The advantages of good reading have been talked over; "Object Lessons" have received attention. The question of the value of Classics in the school has been discussed. In short, there has been, among the teachers, a general outpouring of the teaching spirit. The effect of all this upon the educational work of the Province must be good.

The St. John Sun has an excellent report of our Exhibition. The Sun was the only paper outside the Province which sent a representative. But we hope that in future our Exhibitions may be considered worthy the attention of the Press of the sister Provinces; and we also hope that in future the Island Press may be able to send representatives to the Exhibitions held in the Mainland. The interchange of information, which would thus be afforded, would be beneficial all round—would kindly among the people of the Provinces a kinder feeling—a feeling of respect for each other and each other's capabilities, and would promote inter-provincial emulation and consequent advancement in all. The Sun's correspondent says:—

"In concluding my notice of the cattle show it is proper for me to observe that in most respects it was a decidedly successful affair, the precursor, it is to be hoped, of many grander and more imposing displays in the near future. Much of the success of this and former shows has been due to the zeal and energy of Mr. A. McNeill, the efficient Secretary of the Board of Commissioners, who is untiring in his efforts to advance the agricultural interests of his Province. Nor should I omit to mention Mr. Charles C. Gardiner, who had the cattle show more particularly under his immediate direction, and who, by his intelligence, shrewdness and active zeal, has done much to encourage the improvement of stock and to place the agriculture of the Island in the favorable position which it now occupies. To both these gentlemen I tender my hearty acknowledgments for the ready courtesy with which they advanced the object of my visit to P. E. Island.

In his excellent speech at the opening of the Exhibition the Lieutenant Governor, forcibly presented the benefits received from the Model Farm. The Patriot has also noticed these benefits. The EXAMINER begs to lend its voice to the chorus of praise; and to suggest: (1) that steps be taken towards the erection on the farm, of new and suitable buildings, and (2) that the farm be elevated into an Agricultural College having attached to it at least one Professor of Agriculture, with a chair at Prince of Wales College and Normal School.

With regard to the first suggestion we need not say anything. The present buildings are disgraceful to the farm and the Province; and we are pleased to know that the Government, in conjunction with the Stock Farm Commissioners, are at last considering plans and estimates.

With regard to the second suggestion, we do not deem it necessary to dilate upon the advantage to the Island of the presence of such a man as Professor Sheldon. Nor do we think it necessary to prove that the salary of a Professor of Agriculture might, with propriety, be borne by the public at large. The Province is now paying large sums to teach the gifted few a knowledge of Latin, Greek and Mathematics, that their minds may thereby be trained, and that we may, through them, receive honor abroad. If this be right, surely it is also right that the Province should teach the youth who intend to stay at home and work their father's farms, how to farm on scientific principles—how to compete successfully with the farmers of the other provinces of the Dominion. We commend this suggestion to the attention of the Board of Education. As the Lieutenant Governor has remarked—as every one who knows anything about it must know—the farm has already been an inestimable benefit to the Province. But how much greater would be the advantage of it, if, in addition to annually sending out detachments of well-bred horses, cattle, sheep and pigs, it also distributed throughout the Island, young men, having a scientific as well as a practical knowledge of agriculture.

**Teachers' Convention.**

The second session of the Education Convention, was held yesterday morning in the Hall of the West Kent Street School, commencing at 10 o'clock.

A discussion on the subject of reading was opened by Miss Ball, in a well written, practical paper, showing the advantage of good reading and the means by which it might be attained. An interesting discussion followed, partaken in by several of the members, and was concluded by an address from Principal J. B. Caulkin, who dwelt upon the different methods of teaching reading.

Mr. NEIL McLEOD, then read an admirable paper on School Discipline, showing that discipline was of primary importance in schools, and without it no efforts of the teacher could be effectual, no matter what his attainments might be. He mentioned the different means by which discipline might be maintained in schools.

At the conclusion of the reading of Mr. McLeod's paper, the convention adjourned to meet again at 2 o'clock, p. m.

A lively discussion on the paper read by Mr. McLean in the forenoon followed—at the conclusion of which C. H. Ives, of Cornwall, read an excellent paper on Eye-teaching, showing the importance of a proper use of the blackboard, wall-maps, charts and object-lessons in conveying instruction to the youthful mind through the medium of the eye. At the conclusion of the discussion on this paper the convention adjourned to meet at 8 o'clock for a public meeting, with which the exercises of a very pleasing and profitable convention were concluded.

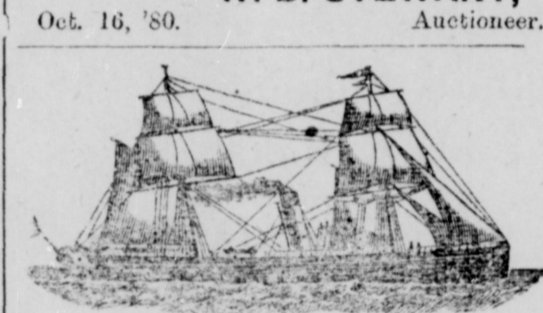
