MORE TROUBLE IN IRELAND.

Police Trying to Prevent Mass Meetings AND CHARGE UPON THE CROWD OF PEOPLE.

Many Injured—Davitt and O'Brien Prevented from Speaking.

DUBLIN, Oct 18.—There was great excitement all night at Balinrobe, County Mayo, due to serious collisions between the people there and the police, owing to a United Irish League meeting being proclaimed.

About 21,000 persons assembled and Michael Davitt and Wm. O'Brien, who were to be speakers, were met outside the town by a detachment of 200 police and were prevented from entering the place. The police were forced to charge the crowd frequently during the night and many persons were injured.

Settler Murdered.

WINNIPEG, Oct 18.—Word has reached this city of the murder of a Galician settler and his four children, in Startburn colony, twenty miles east of Dominion City. His wife is missing, and it is supposed that she committed the crime, as she and her husband did not live happily together.

FEARFUL RAILWAY WRECK.

At Barnet Junction, England.

LONDON, Oct 18.—A terrible accident has occurred on the Great Central Railroad, near Barnet, eleven miles from London. The express train going at a mile a minute came into collision with a freight train that was switching across the track at Barnet Junction. The express piled up a complete wreck. Nine dead and thirteen seriously injured have been recovered from the wreckage and there are others under the debris.

Schr, Howard Ashore.

BOSTON, Oct 18.—The two-masted British schooner Howard, St John to this port, lumber laden, which ran ashore on a ledge three quarters of a mile off Winthrop beach, was floated by tugs. She has three feet of water in her hold, and it is thought her bottom is seriously injured.

The New Gold Commissioner.

OTTAWA, Oct 18.—Edmund C Senkler, of Nelson, B.C. has been appointed Gold Commissioner in the Yukon.

Chinese Reforms.

LONDON, Oct 17.—The Pekin correspondent of the Times says: "Prince Ching, president of the Tsung Li-Yamen, has informed Sir Claude MacDonald officially that the health of the Emperor is improving. He declares that the Empress Dowager is not opposed to genuine reforms, but only to such violent and impracticable reforms as we hastily decreed. Her majesty will proceed on lines more adapted to Chinese conditions."

Snow in Chicago.

CHICAGO, Oct 14.—Snow fell in this city for over an hour last night. It was the first of the season and the earliest in 26 years. A gale accompanied the snowfall, making navigation on Lake Michigan impossible.

Londonderry Orders Rushing

ACADIA MINES, Oct 17.—The Londonderry Iron Company are still rushing out their pipe orders. During the month of September they shipped from this station, 882 tons of water pipe, and six tons of specials, beating the record of any previous month's shipment in the history of this town. The orders have been shipped to towns in Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Prince Edward Island—but the largest shipments have gone to Quebec.

Wonderfully Fast Boat.

WASHINGTON, D. C., October 16.—Consul Metcalf, at Newcastle on Tyne, sends to the State Department a report that the builders of the wonderful turbine-propelled boat Turbinia, which created such a sensation at the British naval review by her extraordinary speed, have begun the construction for a foreign government of two boats of the same style, about 200 feet long, and with 10,000 horse-power. They are guaranteed to make at least 35 knots an hour, but as they are twice the length, six times the weight, and five times the power of the Turbinia, the Consul says it will be interesting to see how far they will exceed her performance of 35 knots.

CHURCH OF ENGLAND QUESTION

Decision of the Primate.

LONDON, Oct 17.—Since John Kensit's anti-ritualistic crusade, the churchmen have been awaiting anxiously for the utterance of the Archbishop of Canterbury on the grave questions raised, which have agitated the whole body of churches. In a series of charges to the clergy, delivered this week, the primate speaks in no uncertain voice. He caused a profound impression in church circles and deeply aggrieved the low church party. The primate declared plainly that the doctrine of the real presence as embodied practically in the doctrine of consubstantiation, is permitted, though not expressly taught by the Church of England; that though compulsory confession is absolutely illegal, voluntary confession is legal, and no clergyman is justified in refusing to hear; and he commended prayers for the dead, but forbade invocation of the saints or the Virgin. He declared the elevation and reservation of the sacrament and use of incense are non permissible; but he approved of a certain revival of the ritual, in conformity with the prescription of the Prayer Book. Practically, the Primate sanctions all the doctrines and practices which the low churchmen have so vehemently condemned, and the high churchmen are proportionately elated. Though they disagree with some points, most of the clergy will fall into line with the primate's charges or injunctions. Kensit, whose followers have been somewhat shaken by Truh's exposure of him, promises a demonstration in a thousand churches during the first Sunday in November.

New Steamship Service.

OTTAWA, Oct 17.—Montague Yates and F A Morgan of Montreal were in town yesterday interviewing the Ministers in reference to the proposed steamship service from Milford Haven to Paspebiac, P. Q., in connection with the Atlantic and Lake Superior railway. These gentlemen wish to complete the through traffic arrangements with the Intercolonial previous to the inauguration of the steamship service. Mr Yates has just returned from England. He says the steamers can be run to Paspebiac all the year round. Sir Louis Davies has not yet been successful in getting a man to get out to the Pacific coast to value the sealing vessels. He wants a maritime province man, but none care to leave at such short notice. The American valuator is now on his way to Victoria.

Rate of Discount

LONDON, Oct 17.—The rise of the discount rate of the Bank of England, from 3 to 4 per cent. to day, momentarily scared the market. People jumped to the conclusion that the bank's action was due to the war scare, and to Lord Rosebery's speech. Calm reflection, however, has shown that it was only a measure of precaution. The persistent buying of gold by the United States and Germany has prevented the bank from securing any, and as a consequence, the bank's reserve is lower than it has been since April last, when a 4 per cent. rate was adopted. According to the best informed opinion, the rise in the rate is purely a financial measure, without any connection with or hint from the government of a delicate political situation. Moreover, looking to the actual large trade indebtedness to the United States, the bank directors were apprehensive that low rates here might facilitate a heavy drain of gold to America later in the season when the American crops came more freely into the market.

OUR MERCHANTS' RESPONSIBILITY.

Sir.—Before attempting the shipment of Island oatmeal to England would it not be well to enquire why it is that more of the article is not manufactured for and sold in our own market. I have heard it stated that about 5000 barrels are imported yearly to this Island, whilst cargoes of good oats are being sent away. And lest you or any other person may be at a loss to account for this state of affairs I shall venture the statement that it is altogether the fault of our merchants who seem to think it no difference where they buy their goods so long as they can sell them. They are doing their best to crowd out every industry which could possibly add to the prosperity of the Island,—the miller, the shoemaker, the tailor, the carriage builder, the blacksmith, the harness maker, and in fact anything and everything for which they can find customers, the consequence being that our towns are not growing under the impulse which would naturally result from the manufacture of such goods amongst ourselves, whilst at the same time affording a market for many farm products which now must seek a market abroad.

Why is it that Nova Scotia farmers have been getting 35 cents for potatoes while here they are not wanted at half the price? Is it not because their towns consume them? We might have thousands of tradesmen doing the same thing. With respect to oatmeal, I may say that I could supply that article required for Souris, and yet whilst hundreds of barrels are being imported I find it difficult to get an order for a ton at a time. The quality of my manufacture is so well known that it needs no puffing, but that makes not the slightest difference. If Ontario rolled oats can be purchased a trifle lower it is bound to come. Well, our little island is going down pretty fast; Ontario is being built up at our expense, and the end is not yet.
