Belgian Acted As German Spy

BRUSSELS, May 2.—The Court of Appeals has dealt a new trial to Armand Jeannes a Belgian who is under sentence of death for acting as a German spy during the war. Jeannes will now be put to death.

While he was convicted of responsibility for the shooting of many Belgian patriots during the period of German occupation, the prosecutor acknowledged that Jeannes had nothing to do with the betrayal of Edith Cavell, the English nurse who was shot by the Germans.

Flood Waters Now Threaten Winnipeg

WINNIPEG, May 2.—Caused by excessive rains in the States of North Dakota and Minnesota, the Red River at Emerson, sixty miles south of this city, has risen six feet since Sunday and flood waters today threaten Winnipeg.

The rise in the Red River water level will prevent flood waters from the Assiniboine River pouring into the Red fast enough to be carried away and alleviate the swollen condition of the Assiniboine.

No steps have been taken yet to prevent possible inundation of sections of the city with the exception of throwing open the locks on the Red River at St. Andrews, 18 miles north of here. Unofficial reports from Emerson state the river has risen seven feet since Saturday. The river is said to be steadily rising.

Fault Found With Lee's Naval Speech

LONDON, May 2.—A somewhat critical attitude is adopted by the Cape Times in editorial comment on the speech recently delivered by Lord Lee, First Lord of the Admiralty, in which he criticized the contribution of the Dominions to Empire naval defence, cables Reuter's Capt. Town correspondent.

The Times allows that the speech was an indirect and timely reminder of the smallness of South Africa's contribution of her maritime security, but, nevertheless, thinks Lord Lee is as much in danger of minimizing the difficulties confronting the Government of the Dominions as the Dominions are of failing to understand the British taxpayers' concern.

The paper expresses the view that Great Britain's burden would have been a great deal heavier but for the influence which the Dominions threw into the scale at the Washington Conference; also that the Admiralty might well be thankful for the reduction of approximately £40,000,000 in the cost of the navy, which is an immediate result of the naval disarmament agreement.

Lord Lee need not despair of reducing the burden by economies adds the Times, without affecting the fleet's efficiency. Meantime the paper believes nothing will be gained by belittling the idea of the Dominion naval services. On the contrary, increased importance must be allotted to them in the future.

The Times suggests that the South African Union might aim at the assumption of full financial responsibility for the upkeep of the coast defences at Simon's Town besides the land defences which already have been taken over. Meantime South Africa is embarking on a policy, which will materially reduce the national commitments in a few years. The Times recognizes that South Africa's present naval effort is trifling compared to the Empire's needs, but in the light of future strategy it has a significance which makes it a wholly undeserved mark for sneers.

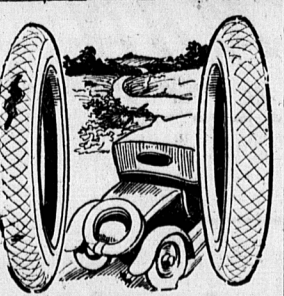
THE REVOLT IN SYRIA

France is reaping the reward of her duplicity and infidelity to her best friend by the revolt of her Moslem friends and subjects in Syria. During the past three years the "traditional" protector of Christian faith in the Orient has lavished in politics, finance and literature, its favors upon the Crescent. Not long ago as a supreme flattery, the Municipal Council of Paris decided to build and consecrate a Mosque in the French capital, while, in defiance of written and moral engagements towards its Allies, the French government concluded a separate treaty with Ankara and undertook to support all the Turkish claims. These actions were generally defended on the plea that it was only by making Moslem sentiment and by restricting her obligations that France could hope to retain control of Syria. And now the whole of Syria is reported to be in open revolt. Disturbances have occurred in many places, including the neighborhood of Beirut and Damascus. In the interior the French forces have had to evacuate Zor on the Euphrates and there are reports of a concerted Bedouin movement against the French. If France and the United States had stood by Great Britain we would now have to look up on the humiliation of the specter of the great assassin of the American restored to his ancient seat of power in Europe.
