THE GOVERNMENT AND PLEBISCITE

The equivocal attitude of the Govern-
ment, its members and its organs, towards
the plebiscite which they have precipitat-
ed is calculated to produce the minimum
of votes for prohibition. At Valleyfield
(Quebec), a few evenings ago, the Hon C.
A. Geoffrion, a member of the Cabinet, de-
livered a speech in response to a toast to
the Government, in the course of which
he said:

"He would have the citizens of Valley-
field remember, that the plebiscite
was not prohibition. The plebiscite had
been granted by the government simply to
redeem a promise which it had made in a
moment of weakness. He spoke only as a
member of the party, not as a Cabinet
Minister, but in his opinion the granting
of the plebiscite was the only mistake the
government had made.

"Prohibition said Mr. Geoffrion, was
the antithesis of the liberalism; it was op-
posed to the very essence of the liberal
principles.

"Personally, he had voted for the pleb-
iscite because the party had pledged it-
self to grant the vote, the same reason had
influenced many of the others. The pro-
hibitionists would have their plebiscite,
but they would have no prohibition."

This from a member of the Government
which granted the plebiscite is remark-
able. But, "In vino veritas." Mr. Geoff-
rion, in his cups, has without doubt reveal-
ed the true inwardness of the Govern-
ment's position in respect to prohibition
and the plebiscite. Sir Henri Joly's opin-
ion is stated in the telegram of to-day.
The very sagacious Mr. Tarte, it is to be
remembered, is also on record as strongly
opposed to prohibition. The Toronto
Globe says that the plebiscite cannot give
prohibition; prohibition can be enacted
only by a Parliament elected to enact it.

The Montreal Herald is convinced of the
rightness of the cause—but there is so
much apathy that it thinks the declaration
for prohibition will not indicate a senti-
ment strong enough to enforce a law. The
Brockville Recorder fears that the vote
will be too small to warrant legislation.
The Hamilton Times says the Tories are
going to declare for prohibition simply to
put the Government in a hole. This
latter is evidently intended as a hint
to Liberals to vote the other way. Alto-
gether the Government and their
organs have evinced a desire that probi-
tion shall be condemned or that
the declaration in favour of prohibition
shall be so weak as not to justify further
action. We mistake the spirit of the
people of this country if they permit them-
selves to be so humbugged in respect to
such an important matter as the probi-
tion of the liquor traffic. The first
step is to return an unmistakable "Yes"
to the Government's question as to the
opinion of the people regarding prohibition.
Then, if the government fail to obey the
mandate of their masters, "turn the rascals
out." That a majority of the people will
not wait long for a government to carry
out their behest is certain, Hon. Mr.
Foster, speaking at a public meeting in
Ottawa, a few days ago, said: "If you want
prohibition vote for the plebiscite. If you
vote for the plebiscite, all British prece-
dent goes to make it certain that probi-
tion you shall have."

By the way, is it not strange that The
Guardian which has not hesitated to cor-
rect Lord Salisbury and to criticize
Principal Grant, has not one word to say
concerning the anti-prohibition declara-
tions of members of the Laurier Govern-
ment?
