CABINET CHANGES.

THE EXAMINER's telegraphic report that Mr. James Sutherland, M. P., has been taken into the Laurier Cabinet is confirmed by newspapers to hand. There are now sixteen members of the government of Canada, while that of the United States is carried on by eight. But the new addition will cost little more than the expense of an additional palace car for him to ride in. Mr. Sutherland represents one of the ridings of Oxford County, Ontario, and Sir Richard Cartwright the other. As it is not usual to draw two members of the government out of one county, it is believed that the appointment of Mr. Sutherland is but preliminary of the retirement of Sir Richard Cartwright. The Mail and Empire remarks that "no doubt Sir Richard will take the High Commissionership, into which it was proposed to retire him when he banked at the \$50,000,000 expenditures. Mr. Sutherland announced himself in a recent interview as a high taxation advocate, and is thus quite in line with the new Liberalism. With him in the Cabinet and Sir Richard out the Ontario Reformers will be without representation or influence in the Government." The Montreal Gazette says that Mr. Sutherland will not leave the lump with any better ideas than are represented by its \$50,000,000 expenditure of last year or its anticipated \$60,000,000 effort of the present year.

THE LIBERAL CONVENTION

SIR,—The reports in the late Boston papers concerning the wild and disgraceful scenes at the meeting of the Massachusetts County democracy were racy. But a good Yankee reporter could get better material for a spicy article if he had attended the recent Liberal Convention at Dundas. No blows were struck; but bad talk and violent language were indulged in. You would not require wireless telephony to distinguish the voices of the contestants a mile away. A delegate told me that "such wrangling he never before saw." On a motion to postpone the convention the "man in charge" suggested that all in favor of the motion should "go out." Two-thirds of the meeting went out; and the remnant made the nomination. So ended the Liberal Convention the like of which was never seen or heard tell of in this country for contention and disorder.
