NOTHING LIKE WOOL.—Mr. W. C. Turner, well known as lead clerk for the McKay Woolen Co., is now the agent of the Moncton Woolen Mills, and has opened a shop in the Masonic Temple building, Grafton Street. Give him a call.
SIXTY ACT.—Sixty Scott Act cases constitute the docket at Police Court this forenoon. The summonses against P. P. Gillis, Angus Macdonald and Duncan McMillan were dismissed. The cases against A. S. Hewitt, P. Curley and Minnie Laughlin were adjourned until Monday next.
KILLED IN COLORADO.—Mr. D. A. Macdonald, of Valleyfield, was accidentally killed in an iron smelter near Colorado Springs last week. The deceased was about 25 years of age, and left this Province five years ago. He was a brother of Mr. Lanchin Macdonald, of J. T. McKenzie's tailoring establishment. His body arrived here last night, and will be taken to Valleyfield this afternoon.
THE MONTH'S RECORD.—There were twelve convictions for drunkenness at the police court during the month of April. Five persons were convicted for violating the Canada Temperance Act, and summonses against five others were dismissed. There was also one conviction for drunkenness for malicious injuries to property, and one for violating sanitary regulations. Three persons were sent up for trial in the Supreme Court.
IS A FREE COUNTRY.—In the Illinois legislature a few days ago a Mr. McCarthy obtained unanimous consent to introduce the following resolution: "Resolved, that the members of the general assembly of the state of Illinois do hereby request the daughters of Illinois not to accept the hand in marriage of any person not a citizen of the United States by right of birth or naturalization, as we are of the opinion that the daughters of Illinois should be patriotic in their views and should disregard the title of any foreigner, and marry none but a citizen of the United States."
AN ISLANDER MARRIED.—The Halifax Herald says: A happy wedding took place at Sheet Harbor on Saturday, when Rev. George Arthur, B. S. of P. E. Island, and Miss Rose McPherson, of Sheet Harbor, were united in marriage. The ceremony was performed by Rev. William Stewart. The young couple have many friends and Rev. Mr. Arthur has endeavored himself to a large circle in this city. Mr. Arthur has been appointed missionary to the Cree Indians. He and Mrs. Arthur leave tomorrow for the scene of their labors. Very many friends follow Rev. Mr. and Mrs. Arthur with best wishes for a long, happy and successful life.
A NEW DEPARTURE.—Mr. Fred H. Sawyer, formerly purser on the steamers Carroll and Worcester, has embarked in the hotel business at Gloucester, Mass. His hotel is called the "Sunrise," and it is fitted and furnished throughout in first-class style. The "Sunrise" is located on a beautiful beach, and commands a fine view of the harbor and ocean. It will be opened to the public on the 10th of June. Mr. Sawyer will give the hotel his personal supervision, which is a guarantee that everything about it will be of the best. Islanders having occasion to visit Gloucester should not fail to give the "Sunrise" a call.
MARINE NEWS.—The steamer Tiber arrived from Montreal last evening with a full cargo. She will take a general outfit tomorrow, and will leave for St. John's Nfld via Halifax tomorrow morning.
The steamer Thames is loading at Montreal and will leave that port on Saturday. She is expected in Charlottetown on Tuesday next.
The steamer Olivette is expected here from Boston about the 16th of May.
The steamer Albert is being loaded at Pownal wharf with potatoes and oats for Cape Breton by Carvell Bros.
The brig Hattie Louise from the West Indies with a cargo of molasses and sugar for Carvell Bros is expected today.
The brig Ada from Barbadoes for A. M. Wright, of Summerside, is in the Gut of Canso.
The Stanley will probably begin the work of placing the buoys in position to-morrow.

CHANGES AND IMPROVEMENTS.

The premises throughout are lighted by electricity.

Patton & Co., and Mr. Patton may now be found at their store ready and willing to accommodate all his old friends and customers as well as any new ones coming along. Thus the business of the McKay Woolen Company, of C. J. Patton & Co., and Geo. A. Dixon & Co., will, so soon as Mr. Dixon moves in, be carried on under the one roof.
The carpenter work was done by Mr. Charles McGregor and the painting by Mr. Patrick Burke.
Mr. J. B. Macdonald has also made a new department. He has had the partition in the centre of his fine new store on Queen Street removed and the whole interior of the store is now one. He has had the ready-made clothing and gentleman's furnishing department of his business removed thereto, and will be most happy to have persons wanting anything in these lines call upon him. He assures the purchasing public that they will be given good value for their money. The whole business in this store, as already stated, is on the first floor. The dry goods and boot and shoe business is conducted at his other store, opposite the western entrance to the market house.
Watson's drugstore will in a few days be removed to the store lately occupied by Geo. Carter & Company, which is being fitted up in first-class style. Captain May is also making extensive alterations to the building on the corner of Grafton and Great George streets, which will in a short time be occupied as a drugstore by Mr. P. Det. Davies. A more extensive reference to these and other improvements will be made later on.
