THE PRINCE PROVINCE.—Says the *Colinist and India*: "With Manitoba coming to the fore so rapidly as she is now doing, it is desirable that all Englishmen should know what it is the proper pronunciation of the word. The name is a corruption of two Cree Indian words—*manito*—spirit, and *wanin*—strait; the original name being given to it from the belief that a certain periodical agitation of the waters in a particular strait in the lake was due to the action of a spirit. The original word was pronounced *manitowaban*, with the accent on the penultimate. Consequently, in the corrupted and shortened word the accent would be on the last syllable—*Manitoba*. This, however has been changed by the Americans, with their mania for brevity, to *Manitoba*, and the inhabitants of the prairie province have themselves adopted this pronunciation, with the emphasis on the *to*, and not on the *ba*."

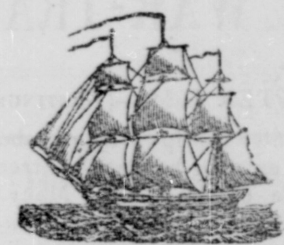
