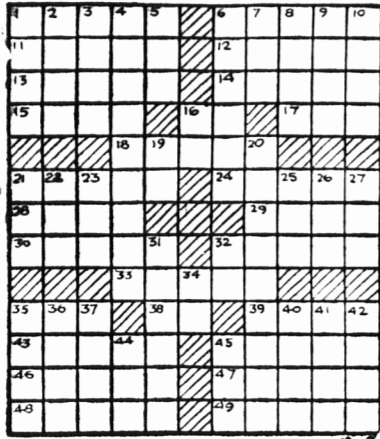

Predicts Round The Moon Flights In Near Future

TROY, N. Y. (AP)—A rocket expert says man will attempt flights around the moon in the near future.

Dr. Werner von Braun declared Friday night that proposed earth satellites can be adapted to carry crews. He predicted that the attempt will be made after the establishment of the first earth satellites, scheduled to be launched in the International Geophysical Year, 1957-58.

Von Braun, now chief of the United States guided missile development division at Redstone Arsenal, Huntsville, Ala., played an important part in Germany's wartime rocket program.

He told a joint meeting of the Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute Astrophysical Society and the Troy Astronomy Club Friday night that the first small satellites will be followed by larger ones with better equipment.

NO NEW PROBLEM

"Soon thereafter," Von Braun added, "man himself will attempt orbital flight. The task of projecting a crew into an orbit amounts essentially to replacing the relatively small rockets" with larger ones.

"It does not pose any fundamentally new problems," he said. "Once manned orbital flight has been attained, a 10-day flight around the moon, not involving a landing thereon, poses a relatively simple problem."

Von Braun said the effects of many of the conditions to which men would be subjected could be studied with the help of stimulated techniques.

"Human centrifuges may be used to train rocket crews to function as a team under high accelerations," he suggested. "Weightlessness can be simulated in flights of present-day rocket aircraft through ballistic arcs. Survival in cockpit can be studied in the laboratory."

RETURN MORE DIFFICULT

He noted that the return of a manned orbital vehicle to the earth's surface would be more difficult. During the slowdown process through the upper atmosphere it would be subject to tremendous heating because of friction with the air, similar to that undergone by meteors.

One possible solution is the use of larger wings, Von Braun commented.
