First Aid For Ailing Homes

By ROGER C. WHITMAN RELOCATING ASPHALT TILE QUESTION: We are rearranging our kitchen floor cabinets and counter.

ANSWER: Yes! Individual asphalt tiles can safely be removed by careful heating with an electric iron so that the adhesive underneath is liquified.

CHALKY HOUSE PAINT QUESTION: Last year I painted my home with a supposed high grade paint.

ANSWER: Some paints are deliberately designed to chalk. This type of wearing off permits rain and rinsing to carry accumulated dirt away with the chalky surface deposit.

RUSTY STALL BOTTOM QUESTION: We have an extra metal shower stall in the basement. The bottom is getting very rusty.

ANSWER: Remove any present paint down to the bare metal; then take off the rust with coarse steel wool and turpentine or liquid rust-remover.

PLANTER ON PATIO QUESTION: How to build a planter on a cement patio? This will involve drainage to prevent cracking from freezing.

N.S. Veteran Dies At Camp Hill

KENTVILLE — Josiah MacLeod, 81, Highbury, died Jan. 28 in Camp Hill Hospital, Halifax. A veteran of World War I, he lost the use of one lung in 1918 when gassed at Vimy Ridge while serving with the Royal Canadian Regiment.

Born in Boston, the son of the late Hector and Lavina (Wills) MacLeod, he spent most of his early life in Prince Edward Island. He came to Nova Scotia at the age of 18, and worked as a tailor in Halifax, and later owned his own shops in Glace Bay and Sydney.

After spending five years at the Nova Scotia Sanatorium, Kentville, from 1918 to 1923, he settled in the Annapolis Valley. Mr. MacLeod was a member of the United Church of St. Paul and St. Stephen, Kentville, and the Kings Branch, Royal Canadian Legion.

He was twice married, his first wife, the former Minetta Sudbury, of Sydney, died in 1933. Surviving are his second wife, the former Julia Hiltz; three sons: Earle, Harvey and Everett MacLeod, all of Kentville; four daughters, Ethel (Mrs. Joseph Potter) Bear River; Evelyn, Halifax; Annie (Mrs. Norman Dowe), Vancouver, Nima (Mrs. Philip Barkhouse) Ontario; three brothers, Fullerton, Harry and Albert, and one sister, Irene (Mrs. Joseph MacLeod) all of Prince Edward Island; sixteen grandchildren and 17 great grandchildren.

The funeral was held Jan. 31 from the United Church of St. Paul and St. Stephen. The minister, the Rev. K.G. Sullivan conducted the service. Interment was in Elm Grove Cemetery.

The Kings Branch Canadian Legion held their service at the graveside.

Chamber Again Backs Courses

The bookkeeping course will be 14 weeks long while the rest will be 10 weeks. All courses will be at the Provincial Vocational Institute. Registration for all except bookkeeping will be Monday night, Feb. 7 at 7 p.m.
