### International Dog Derby Begins Today

OTTAWA, Feb. 7—(CP)—Rivalry is building up between a Manitoba and a Quebec musher for top honors in the gruelling 100-mile annual International Dog Derby.

Prime Minister St. Laurent will start 18 teams off tomorrow on the first of three 33 1/3-mile daily heats. The winner will receive a challenge trophy and a \$1,000 purse. The race will continue Friday and conclude Saturday.

Figuring in the rivalry are Wilf LePine of Quebec, 1950 derby winner and defending champion, Laird Ouellette, 38-year-old C.N.R. fireman from The Pas, Man., who captured 1950 honors in the Canadian Open Championship Dog Derby at The Pas.

Caring for his dogs at Lansdowne Park on the eve of the race, LePine was confident.

"I'm going to win this one," he said, "and then come back next year to get permanent possession of the challenge trophy."

To do this, a driver must finish first three years running.

Asked about Ouellette, he said: "I admit he'll be a serious contender and will need watching but I'm not afraid. I've got eight well-trained cross-bred hounds—three more than last year—and that should make a lot of difference."

Meanwhile, Ouellette, interviewed in his hotel room, also was confident, but shied away from any boastful remarks. Said the tanky, mild-speaking The Pas man: "The best team will win and we'll be out to do just that."

"I have seven dogs, the same team that won me the two-day, 144-mile The Pas Derby last year, and I am counting on them again this time."

One thing was worrying Ouellette—the weather. The day before the scheduled start, the temperature in the capital rose to almost 40 degrees.

"I don't know how the change in climate will affect my huskies, but I sure am hoping for colder weather before starting time."
