EXHIBITIONS

Last Wednesday, September 28th, the completion of the County Shows and Exhibitions that are annually held throughout the Province each year. These Shows for most part were very successful and afforded an opportunity for people in the different areas to exhibit an example of their livestock and field crops. It also gives ladies an opportunity to view one another in handiworks and cooking. There has always been a considerable controversy over whether or not exhibitors who exhibit at a Class "A" Fair should show. While not taking sides, or entering into any arguments pro or con, there is possibly one class of people who have not been considered in this matter. In this connection reference is made to the farmer who is a spectator at these shows, and the benefit that he may derive from watching a class of animals placed in which there are some outstanding individuals. These spectators far outnumber the exhibitors, and if we are going to host our different breeds within the Province we must show these spectators the kind of animal that should look for in his own herd. This matter was quite thoroughly discussed at a meeting of representatives of the different Breed Associations held recently, and while nothing conclusive was arrived at, nevertheless, many of the speakers expressed their views on this matter.

It is hoped that there may be one or two entries of our little pig forward to the Royal Winter Fair this year, and there has also been an entry of sheep made for the Royal, which is possibly the first time that this class of livestock from Prince Edward Island has been exhibited at the Royal Winter Fair.

Prize Lists are now out for the Maritime Winter Fair, which is being held this year from October 29th to November 6th, and it is noted that livestock entries close on October 8th, with all other entries closing on October 14th. With the closing entries for livestock at Amherst on October 8th, it does not give livestock exhibitors very much time to make out their entries, but we would like to suggest that this be done as quickly as possible, and the entries forwarded to the Secretary-Manager at Amherst.

Entries for the Royal also close on October 8th and any thinking of exhibiting there should also get their entries in at the earliest possible moment.

**MARITIME WINTER FAIR**

The forty-second Maritime Winter Fair under the auspices of the Maritime Stock Breeders' Association will be held, as usual, at Amherst, Nova Scotia. The dates are Saturday, October 29, to and including Saturday, November 6.

Livestock entries close next Saturday, October 8. All other entries close on October 14. The Secretary-Manager is Mr. Alex Thompson, Amherst, N. S.

In the dairy breeds judging will be as follows: Holsteins and Guernseys (young and dry classes) on Tuesday, November 1; the milking groups on Wednesday.

Ayrshires and Jerseys (young and dry classes) on Thursday and the milking groups on Friday.

Herefords, Shorthorns (R. O. P.) and beef breeding classes will be judged on Monday as well as beef steers.

The judging in foxes will commence on Saturday, October 29 and the milk on Thursday, November 3.

The Swine on Tuesday and the sheep on Wednesday.

**POTATO TOP KILL**

Last year one livestock owner lost seven out of ten milking cows from Potato Top Kill. The potatoes were next to a pasture and as the result of drift spray the grass became contaminated.

These chemical top killers contain a high percentage of arsenic which is highly poisonous to livestock. Be sure to pay attention to all warnings on the labels of any spray material.

Harrington district are planning to organize a food club, and we have a number of other interested centres.

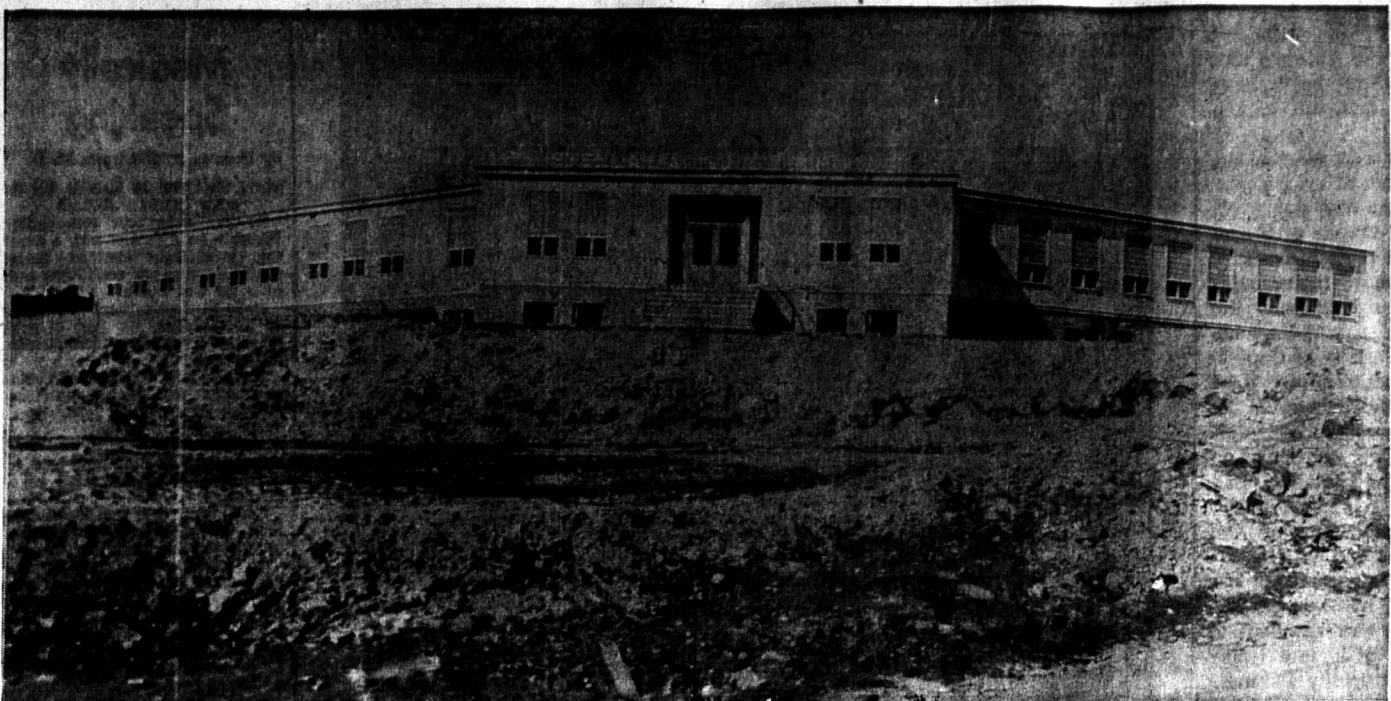

## NEW HIGH SCHOOL AT NORTH RUSTICO

The beautiful new Stella Maris High School at North Rustico pictured above will be officially opened this afternoon in an impressive ceremony at three o'clock.

Mr. Neil A. Matheson, M. P., Queens County will officially open the school. Among others present at the opening will be Most Reverend Malcolm A. MacEachern, Bishop of Charlottetown, Dr. L. W. Shaw, Director of Education; Judge J. Sylvère DesRoches and Messrs. R. R. Bell, M.L.A. and George Kitson, M.L.A.

The school will be blessed this morning by Monsignor J. A. Murphy, parish priest at Souris. Father Murphy will offer Mass at nine o'clock and after Mass will bless the school.

The modern, up to date school contains 14 rooms of which ten are regular class rooms. In addition to the regular class rooms there is a fully equipped science laboratory, a library for 3,000 books as well as a music room and Home Economics and Domestic Science class rooms. There is a play room and lunch room in the basement.

The new building replaces the old school which was destroyed by fire on March 20, 1954. Construction was commenced in July, 1954 and the new school was in use by January of this year.

The building is actually composed of three divisions with the central body being flanked by two wings. One of the wings is 90 feet long and the other wing 130 feet. Total cost of constructing and equipping the building was approximately \$75,000.

Approximately 280 students are enrolled at the school. Class rooms for the high school students are in one wing of the building while the students from Grades 1 to 8 occupy the other wing.

School Principal is Sister St. Mary Eugenia. There is a staff of ten teachers.

The building is a one storey wooden structure. It is equipped with all modern furniture, fluorescent lights and is oil heated. The floors are covered with tile while the rooms are painted different shades of pastel colors.

Business manager for construction of the school was Mr. Joseph Godin of North Rustico while the contractor was Mr. Earl Gallant of North Rustico.

Much credit for the successful construction of the school is due to Mr. Richard Gauthier, chairman of the past Board of Trustees along with Messrs. Leo Ronald Gallant and Ernest Buote. Following are the present Board of Trustees: Messrs. Ernest Buote, Peter Leo Gallant, John Leo Dolron and Cyril Pineau.

## No Such Thing As Super Nutrition Says Expert

**OTTAWA CP**—You don't need to take vitamin pills if you eat three square meals a day, says a nutrition expert of the federal health department.

Nourishing meals which include a variety of foods will provide all the vitamins a normal person needs, says Dr. J. A. Campbell, chief of the food and drug division's nutrition laboratory, writing in a health department magazine.

Some people have the notion that if reasonable amounts of vitamins maintain good health, excessive amounts will give extra pep and enable them to "burn the candle at both ends and not feel it," Dr. Campbell says.

"Vitamins don't work that way," he says. Excess vitamins are not used by the body.

"It has never been shown that there is a state of 'super' nutrition as distinct from adequate nutrition."
