CANADIAN BACON.

Messrs HODGSON BROS have written to The Farmers Advocate a letter which is encouraging to Canadian farmers interested in pork raising and which ought to stimulate the farmers of this Province to produce hogs equal in point of quality to those produced by Ontario. We quote the letter in full:

Sir,—We have received your favor of the 23rd. We do not ourselves deal in Irish or Danish bacon, but from our knowledge of the trade we know that Irish need not be taken into account in estimating the prospect for Canadian meats. The trade in Irish bacon is rapidly diminishing and there seems more disposition to look to Canada and Denmark for supplies of hog produce to supplement the home production. We are quite at a loss to suggest any improvement that can be made in Canadian bacon. It gives general satisfaction; and while there is a prejudice in some quarters against anything that is not marked Danish, Canadian meat is quickly forcing its way to the front on its own particular merits. So long as the Canadians continue to send well fed, solid meat, such as they have been sending lately, and continue to pay particular attention to evenness of cutting and regular sizing (for weights that will sell in one district will not sell in another, and it is a great drawback to have different sized sides in the same box), there is no question but that Canadian meat will continue to give satisfaction in this country. They have made their meat popular and created a demand for it which will increase each year, and we think that the increase will be to the detriment of Danish bacon, which, however, continues to maintain the highest position here. It is an opinion founded upon close observation and knowledge of the trade here, and should serve to stimulate Canadian packers to make further bids for the best of the trade. We are,

ESTEEMED EXCHANGES.

Canadian Churchman: We know that a good many Americans think it a distinct advantage to have alongside of them a country governed by methods somewhat different from their own. The better Americans are by no means blind to the disadvantages of their own system; and although they may not prefer ours on the whole, yet they feel the advantage of being able to appeal to it in certain cases.

Harpers Weekly: Mr. Hay is coming home from his mission to England with much deserved glory. He seems to have achieved the friendship of the English, and to be regarded as a promoter of an Anglo-American alliance. At least, his admirers on the other side speak of him as having greatly advanced international friendship. In view of this we are moved to suggest a kindly recognition of the admirable work which was done by his predecessor, Mr Bayard in this same direction. Mr Bayard was once the object of much vituperation on account of his friendly towards Great Britain, but now that Mr Hay is coming home covered with glory because he has been a friend of Great Britain it is only fair to call attention to the much greater deeds in behalf of international friendship that were performed by Mr. With much courage and with greater persistency, he stood up as a believer in the creed that blood is thicker than water. Never neglecting his duty nor overlooking his loyalty to his own country, he did more than all the other American ministers to Great Britain combined to promote and strengthen the friendship between his own country and England. He was one of the most conspicuous figures in London society, and he was not only the welcome, but the honored guest at most public festivities of the British capital. His own high character, his commanding abilities, his varied accomplishments, and his genial nature made him a favorite with the people at whose court he was the American representative, so that without taking anything from the credit due to Mr. Hay we may recall what is the larger credit due to Mr. Bayard.

The Haytian Government is very considerate of the comfort of soldiers. Every picket is supplied with a chair. Her Majesty the Queen will soon celebrate her jubilee as "Lady of Balmoral." She purchased Balmoral in the summer of 1848, and took possession of it in the following September. HE ACCUSES HIS FIANCEE.

Says She Got His Good Money, Then Refused to Marry Him.

THOMAS HOWARD HAS PRETTY MARY HYDE COMMITTED FOR TRIAL.

STRATFORD, Sept. 26.—At the police court here a few days ago Thomas Howard, a widower, charged Miss Mary Hyde, whom not long ago he was engaged to marry, with the theft of \$215. The story he told was that shortly after their engagement he gave her \$290, to put in the bank with some of her money, and on the Saturday before the Wednesday set for the wedding he gave her \$15 to "get some things" to be married in. On the Sunday evening when he went to see her she had told him that she liked her father better than him, and indefinitely postponed the marriage, but refused to return the \$215. Then she left the room, and after waiting an hour he had gone away.

He confided his troubles to a friend, and together they watched the rail to the station all night, to see that Mary did not get away. About five o'clock in the morning they roused the family and demanded the money again. The girl's father told him he knew nothing of Mary's engagement; that she was her own boss and he was a fool to give her the money. When asked why she had acted as she had, she said Howard had insulted her. After several futile attempts to recover his money the charge was laid.

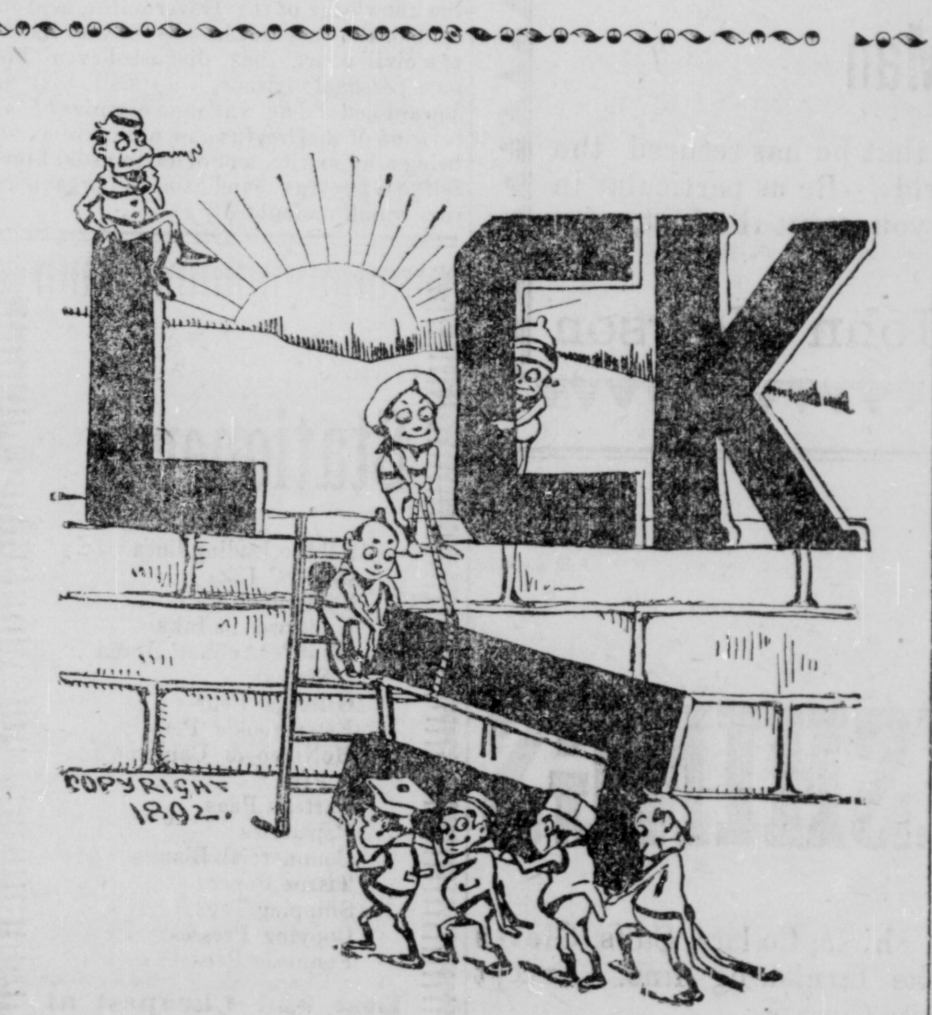

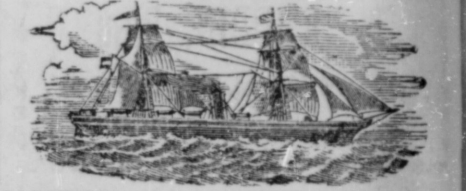
