Liberal Leader Campbell Addresses St. Peter's Rally

The people of Prince Edward Island have had enough of Rip Van Winkle government. Liberal Leader Alex Campbell said in addressing a public rally at St. Peter's hall Thursday night. "What the people want and most desperately need at once is alertness in government, wide-awakeness in all branches of the administration."

"If the island is to gain its rightful place in national prosperity," Mr. Campbell continued, "there must be vision, vigor, boldness, and breadth in provincial policies. That is what the new Liberals are pledged to provide. That is what we shall deliver when you elect us to office next Monday. We stand by our original program. We have never departed from it and that most certainly goes for \$100 for all old age pensioners and for improved wages for both women and men."

Mr. Campbell declared that the apparent awakening of the Shaw government in recent weeks after seven years of slumber, reminded him of the famous tale of Rip Van Winkle.

"Like old Rip Van, they are still rubbing their eyes in surprise," he said, "to find that all around them, throughout the rest of Canada, times and conditions have profoundly changed—greatly for the good while the government of this province has slept blissfully on, grudgingly content to munch the crumbs of federal aid but lacking the energy and courage to go after the whole loaf of Ottawa assistance available for the taking."

Davies, Gaudet Address Rally

Municipalities will get a better deal from the new Shaw administration than at any other time in our history, 5th Queens Conservative candidate Tom Davies said last night.

Speaking to a crowd estimated at 4,000 at a Conservative "Go-Go rally" Mr. Davies said the planks in the Shaw platform concerning municipalities include aid for the construction of sidewalks and parking facilities. Aid will be available to municipal fire departments that cover construction grants for elementary schools will be increased to \$10,000 per classroom.
