Six Week Army Course Starts At Summerside

The Summerside Armouries has taken on an air of professional soldiering with the commencement of a six week course for recruits and non commissioned officers of the "C" Squadron of the Prince Edward Island Regiment.
The commanding officer of the Summerside Squadron, Major F. J. MacNeill, E.D., said yesterday that the course, one of many to be run, is under the technical supervision of a Royal Canadian Armoured Corps representative from Eastern Command, Squadron Sgt. Major P. W. Marlon, a member of the Instruction and Administration set-up that provides active force instructors for reserve force units. All officers of the Summerside Squadron and some of the N. C. O.'s are teaching the various phases of the training which is held three times weekly, Tuesday and Friday nights and on week ends.
The training program commenced last Tuesday night but Major MacNeill said that it is not too late for new members wanting to train as citizen soldiers to enroll.
In addition to the Summerside men undergoing the course, a troop from Kensington, under command of Major G. L. Monkley

English Aircraft Land At Summerside Station

Four large 4-engine aircraft whose home base is in England, landed in Summerside on Sunday afternoon as part of a long range navigation training flight to give the course members practical experience in long range navigation.
Since leaving their home base they have visited the Azores and Bermuda before coming to Summerside. From here they leave before dawn tomorrow morning for Iceland before returning home.
The four big Lincoln aircraft of the Royal Air Force each had a crew of ten men, and while in Summerside the crews are inspected by the facilities and methods of the Royal Canadian Air Force, and a considerable portion of their time during their short stay here will be spent in discussing navigation techniques with staff members of the R. C. A. F.'s central navigation school.
The home base of these big Lincoln aircraft, which are larger than the main navigation school of the R. A. F. in England.
Although a visit of the Canadian specialist navigation course to the United Kingdom has been an annual event for the past three years it is believed that this is the first time that a return visit has been made.
The operation is under the command of Wing Commander S. G. Baggott, D.F.C. who was stationed at Summerside in 1942 when this station first began navigation training.
At a press conference at noon yesterday W.C. Baggott said that he was very impressed with what he has seen at the Air Navigation School in Summerside, and he remarked on the huge banks of snow in evidence at this station, which is quite in contrast with the weather they had experienced on their visit to the Azores and Bermuda.
With the visiting airman is Squadron Leader N. Thorp of Winnipeg who is the R. C. A. F. exchange officer at the R. A. F. base at Summerside prior to going to England and he is quite pleased to get back for the short visit.
Included along on this long distance flight is a Canadian, Flight Lieutenant F. R. Edmonson, of Oakville, Manitoba, who is second pilot in one of the aircraft. F. L. Edmonson enlisted with the R. A. F. A.P. during the last war.
Along on this course is an Australian flight lieutenant, and a New Zealander who has been with the R. A. F. in England for ten years.
The press conference was arranged at the chief training officer R. C. A. F. Station, Summerside Wing Commander Dilworth, and the acting Public Relations Officer Pilot Officer Clare Foot.

Through the courtesy of the Canadian Legion the second floor of the Legion Home will be placed at the disposal of the club and the battery of phones will be installed there instead of at the radio station as in former years.
Proceeds of the auction will be used by the Y's Men to carry on their youth work in the town of Summerside.

S'side Rink To Be Closed

It was announced over the week end that the open air rink on Notre Dame Street operated this season for the first time by Mr. Harold Gaudet and Mr. J. K. Curran would not be operated any longer this season on a commercial basis and that at the end of the season the dressing rooms, canopies, etc., erected last summer and fall would be dismantled. Reason given for this action by the proprietors was that the general public did not support the project in the manner anticipated by the proprietors when they erected the rink as a means of giving the town such a place of recreation.

Let's Talk It Over

The Romance of Words
There is sometimes quite an interesting story behind the derivation of an English word. "Disaster" is one of the more interesting ones. One of the Latin words for "star" is "astra." That's why we call those pretty blue flowers that beautify our autumn landscape, and look like stars, "asters." The stars we find in books to call attention to a footnote are called "asterisks."
Astrology was what might be called the forerunner of our present science of astronomy, and the old-timers placed great stress on the influence of the moon and stars on a person's life. We still use the expression "lucky star." If you were away from your lucky star, you were in danger of meeting with disaster (dis-from, and aster-star).
Similarly the Latin word for "moon" is "luna" and people who were believed to be a little off, or "crazy" (from "ex" out of, and "center" of the center, under certain phases of the moon were called lunatics.
Quite recently I read of the very interesting story behind the word "calculus." It has to do with the old Roman equivalent of our modern taximeter. In a two-wheeled Roman vehicle there was sometimes found in the back a tin can with a revolving cover that held a quantity of pebbles. Each time the wheel turned, the metal cover also revolved, and a pebble dropped into a receptacle below. At the end of the trip the pebbles were counted and your bill was "calculated." The Latin for "pebble" is "calculus."

Two men who for over half a century played a prominent part in protecting the citizens of Summerside from fire, ex. chief W. E. MacNeill and deputy Claude Kenny were honored last evening by the department at the annual banquet of the Summerside firemen held at Robson's Restaurant.
Presided over by the newly elected chief, Abdou Arsenault, the banquet was attended by His Worship Henry W. Wedge and Councillors J. G. Sheen, J. L. Driscoll, Clarence Steele, and H. B. Schurman also Messrs. R. B. Dewar and Andrew Perry of the Water and Sewerage Commission. A special guest at the banquet was Chief Seegmiller of the R. C. A. F. station fire fighting brigade.
On behalf of the Town Council, the citizens of the town and the members of the Fire Department, Mayor Wedge presented to ex. chief MacNeill and his retiring deputy Kenny a beautiful table lamp each and said "Tonight marks another historic event in the annals of our fire department. I refer to the retirement of Fire Chief W. E. MacNeill and his Deputy Claude Kenny after long and meritorious service to our town both as members of the department and as chief and deputy chief respectively. Chief MacNeill has been a fireman some 52 years of which 25 years he served as Chief. Deputy Chief Kenny has been a member some 35 years, serving 7 years as deputy chief. I know it is the wish of all our citizens, your Town Council and members of the Fire Department that these worthy citizens be given public recognition and deserved thanks for all these years of almost gratuitous service to their home town and fellow citizens.
At this time as Mayor of Summerside, it is my pleasant duty to present to Mr. MacNeill and Mr. Kenny tokens of the esteem in which they are held by all the people of Summerside, and I ask them to accept these, not for their intrinsic value but simply as symbols and lights to brighten the years to come. May they be years of health and happiness."
Ex. Chief MacNeill and Deputy Kenny responded in fitting terms giving credit to all who assisted in bringing the fire department to its present state of efficiency. Chief Sigmiller of the R. C. A. F. station extended a warm welcome to all the firemen to visit his department and inspect his equipment at any time.
Brief congratulatory addresses were made by the Councillors present and members of the Water and Sewerage Commission, by George Hogz, who has been secretary of the department for the past 40 years and by Chief of Police White, all expressive of their regard for the men who are retiring and conveying best wishes for many years of future association with the department at least in an advisory department. During the evening several most interesting films were shown dealing with fire prevention. The films were procured through the courtesy of Mayor Wedge and were shown by A. G. Rogers, using the projector of the Summerside Y's Men's Club. Mr. Rogers assured the members of the department that he would be pleased to attend their meeting at any time and bring along the Y's Men's projector and show any film dealing with work of the Fire Department.
