Report Steel Demand Now Picking Up

CLEVELAND (AP) - Despite recent price increases the demand for steel is picking up, the magazine Steel reports today.

Senator Estes Kefauver (Dem. Tenn.) had predicted raising steel prices would reduce demand and production.

"Our customers didn't stand up and shout hooray," admitted Logan T. Johnson, executive vice-president of Amoco Steel Corporation, "but their reaction was generally favorable."

Although increased demand was slight following the price increase, Steel says, the gains indicate the market's latest strength.

Consumers are buying steel because they need it. By the end of the month, surplus inventories will be liquidated and users will be ordering as much steel as they consume.

Last week, steel making operations held at 59 per cent of capacity. Production was about 1,530,000 net tons of steel for ingots and castings.

SCRAP PRICE STRONG Scrap continued its upward trend. The magazine's composite price on prime grade scrap jumped \$2 a ton to \$42.

With new automobile production about to start, the upturn in production from April's recession low should continue through the fourth quarter, Steel says.

The magazine predicted it is unlikely capacity operations will be achieved, but fourth-quarter operations should be in the 60 to 70 per cent range.
