Industrial Park Study Underway

A study of the Greater Metropolitan area of Charlottetown was started Wednesday, by George Mowbray, and George Shaw, members of the firm of Stevenson and Kellogg Ltd. to determine the need and suitability of an industrial park in the area. A request was made by the Charlottetown Board of Trade to the Atlantic Development Board for such a study in this area.

The Board is assisting the consultants in the study and will seek information from manufacturers and wholesalers in the area, as to their present occupancy for space, land, number of employees anticipated growth and their interest in an industrial park.

During the past few days the consultants have discussed opening phases of the project with Premier Alex Campbell and several cabinet ministers, along with various department officials. They also met with the principals of Industrial Enterprises Ltd. A meeting with Mayor Cox was held yesterday afternoon at City Hall, to discuss the project.

The consultants have reported that the survey will be completed sometime in the new year.

Kings Deanery Holds Workshop

A five session workshop in sacred music, sponsored by the Roman Catholic Southern King's Deanery, will be held on Thursday evening of each week, the first of which opened last night in St. Mary's Parish Hall, Moncton.

The sessions are aimed at fitting lay people for a better part in the liturgy, and therefore all adults interested in church music, whether choir members or not, are urged to attend.

Five specialists in music will conduct the workshop under such headings as: the role of music in the liturgy, voice production, rudiments of music, direction of choirs, and problems of organization.

Rev. Pierre Arseneault opened last night's session with the Role of music in the liturgy. Conducting future sessions will be Sister Mary Honora CND, Sister Mary Winifred CSM, Sister St. Felix CND, and Rev. E. Van de Ven.

The workshop is meant to be very practical and a great deal of the time will be devoted to practicing hymns and sung masses. It is hoped that with the ever increasing role of music in the liturgy the workshop will be an aid to the parishioners in fulfilling this role.

The deanery comprises the parishes of Cardigan, Georgetown, Iona, Montague, Morell, St. Theresa's, Sturgeon and Vernon River.
