LETTER FROM THE QUEEN.

Unbounded Pleasure Afforded by the Jubilee Celebration.

SYMPATHY BETWEEN QUEEN AND PEOPLE.

Will Discharge Her Duties as Long as Life Lasts.

LONDON, July 17.—In the course of a letter from the Queen to the Secretary of State is the following:

"During my progress through London on the 22nd of June, this great enthusiasm was shown in a most striking manner and can never be effaced from my heart. It is indeed deeply gratifying, after so many years of labor and anxiety for the good of my beloved country to find that my exertions have been appreciated throughout my vast empire. In weal and woe, I have ever had the true sympathy of all my people which has been warmly reciprocated by myself. It has given me unbounded pleasure to see so many of my subjects from all parts of the world assembled and to find them joining in acclamations of loyal devotion to myself and would wish to thank them all from the depth of my grateful heart. I shall ever pray God to bless them and to enable me still to discharge my duties for their welfare as long as life lasts."

BISLEY, July 17.—The Kolapore Cup competition was won yesterday by the Victoria team. Their score was 751; the New Zealand team was second, with a score of 748; the Canadian team third with a score of 735.

LONDON, July 17.—A despatch from Sydney, New South Wales, says that Frank Butler, the Australian bush murderer, was executed yesterday. He confessed to having committed four murders.

WINNIPEG, July 15.—The latest conquest of Manitoba flour is South America, to which continent a consignment has just been shipped from here. It goes via the Quebec Steamship Company from New York to Georgetown, Demerara, and British Guiana, South America.

CHICAGO, July 14.—The efficacy of prayer is to be tried by the Women's Christian Temperance Union in the matter of raising the \$250,000 necessary to clear the Women's temple from debt. The Union has set aside Monday next as the special day of prayer. Should the debt not be paid before January next the building at Monroe and La Salle streets will pass into the hands of Marshall Field. The amount owed is about \$300,000. Marshall Field has promised to give \$50,000 if payment is made before the first of the year.

VANCOUVER, July 15.—Word has been received that five big buyers of canned salmon have combined to bear the market in England, which accounts for the low price of salmon at present. This action jeopardizes the big Washington State and British Columbia interests, and the livelihood of thousands of fishermen. A number of the big canners say the element of risk is so great this year that they will stop canning or retire from the business, as five Englishmen have it in their hands to ruin a great industry. These statements are on the authority of leading canners of the country. The industry, it is thought, may be saved by a counter scheme, namely the purchase of all the canneries obtainable by one English syndicate. Negotiations in this direction are now pending.

BANGOR, Me., July 15.—On Thursday morning another placard was found upon the door of St. Mary's parochial school in this city. The article was exactly like the others in style, and was composed as follows:

Roman Catholics tremble, for the Knights of Death are out to act. This is the third placard and the last. We have given you fair warning, and now look out. We, the Knights of Death, are strong in numbers, fearless and determined. Roman Catholics, we fear you not, but you know that you fear us. We have sworn to stand together and strike blow after blow against you. Vicar General O'Brien, fire will soon rid the city of this accursed school. The destruction of this school will be our first step. Ho, for the fire brand!

(Signed) KNIGHTS OF DEATH. The placard was given to the police, who are at work. There is no clue to the perpetrator. Curiously enough the placards have been posted at intervals of exactly five days, July 4, July 9 and July 14.

PHILADELPHIA, July 15.—Dr. Charles E. Cadwalder, end of one of Philadelphia's oldest and most exclusive families, was married today in St. Paul's Episcopal church to Bridget Mary Ryan, his former housemaid. The marriage caused quite a sensation in society circles here. The bride came to this country from Tipperary Ireland, and three years later entered the doctor's employ as a housemaid. The doctor took more than an employer's interest in the fair Irish girl and finally proposed marriage. The young lady accepted, and after vainly endeavoring to have the Roman Catholic church, of which she was a member, waive all restrictions, Miss Ryan gave up her religion and joined St. Paul's Episcopal church, of which Dr. Cadwalder is a member. Dr. Charles E. Cadwalder is a descendant of the famous John Cadwalder, who arrived in America in 1687. The bride comes of poor, but respectable Irish parents. She is 21 years of age, while her husband has passed 50.

MEETING AT GRANDVIEW.

A large and intelligent meeting of the electors was held at Grandview on the 14th inst.

The meeting was addressed by the candidates on both sides, also by Alex. Martin, E. Q., M. P., and Mr. John F. McLeod. Messrs. McLean and Wood, the people's candidates, were again and again cheered to the echo as they scored point after point against the One-Man Government and exposed its record of broken promises, reckless expenditure of the public money, huge deficits, increased taxation and the numerous other shameful acts of which it stands guilty.

The Peters candidates made feeble efforts to answer the charges made against their leader, but without effect, for the indignation of the people would not suffer them to practice their deceit here, and they received such a set-back as must have made them feel certain of an overw helming defeat on the 21st inst.
