On Sunday night, February 26, the Mount Y.P.U. of Montague United Church met in the classroom. During the past several weeks there has been considerable activity around the Montague Fire Department with the volunteer firemen detachment holding several meetings. The detachment includes Fire Chief Murray Johnson, Bert MacDonald, Fred Vuomo, Wallace Jenkins, Doug Coffin, Ralph Beck, Carl Stewart, Leland Nelson and Claude Nicholson. Mrs. Johnson, who served with the St. John Fire Department for the past ten years, is training the members in their fire fighting duties, and although no actual practice has taken place, one may be held in the not too far distant future. The installation of a buzzer system in the homes of the members is also in the offing so that they may be quickly notified of the fire, and proceed immediately to the fire hall to take out the equipment. The equipment itself has been given a special overhaul and is now in perfect working order. On the main unit there is 1,750 feet of 2 1/2 inch hose which can reach almost any part of the town from the river. There is also 1,000 ft of 1 1/2 in. hose which can be quickly coupled to the 2 1/2 inch hose. Besides the main pumper which has been completely gone over, the secondary pumper is being overhauled as an auxiliary unit. The chemical unit which is complete in itself has 100 feet of hose so that it can handle any small fire when caught early. The men who are responsible for these notable improvements are to be commended and should receive the support of every citizen in the community, since, without remuneration, they are offering their services to the citizens as an increase to the fire protection.

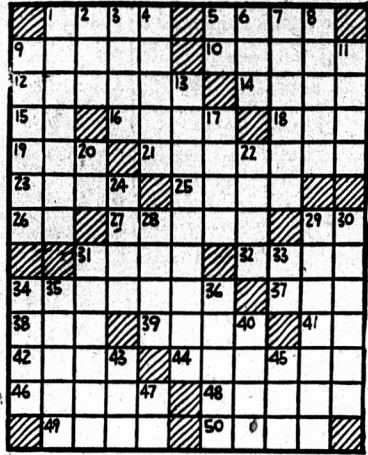
MONTAGUE W. M. S.
