UC Men's Conference Has Stirring Address

"The responsibility of every Christian to help his brother... laws no exemptions of race, creed or condition," said Dr. C. Nicholson who was theme speaker at a conference of United Church Men held at Stanhope, Prince Edward Island, Oct. 11-13.

Dr. Nicholson who is principal of Pine Hill Divinity Hall and a former moderator of the United Church spoke on the theme, "Whose neighbor are we?" He said the great trouble with much of present day religion is a matter of fulfilling the law. "We may live up to the letter of the law and thus make ourselves self-righteous (thank God we are not at other men are) but our religion will be meaningless if it does not result in Christian service motivated by the love of Christ," he added.

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Special Tax Treatment Plan Studied

Admitting that he had not been in close touch with the federal government's policy of deferring certain areas of Canada for special tax treatment, Premier Walter R. Shaw said Saturday that the whole situation will be looked into to see if any special tax treatment is available for the proposed special tax treatment.

On Friday Ottawa had announced that 35 labor markets had been mapped out in Canada, in which this special treatment will be offered to attract new industry and manufacturing.

Special tax treatment in the 35 so-called "designated areas" of high unemployment and slow growth in Canada would include a holiday from income tax for the first three years of operation for new industries. There also would be a fast two-year write off of new machinery and accelerated depreciation on new buildings.

Three Maritime provinces have 13 of the designated areas. In Nova Scotia they are New Glasgow, Sydney, Sydney Mines, Amherst, Springhill, Inverness and Liverpool, in New Brunswick, Miramichi, Moncton, St. Stephen, Sussex and Woodstock, and in Newfoundland, Corner Brook.
