

French Reds Open Drive To Block Arms To Germany

PARIS, (Reuters)—The French Communist party, backed by Communist organs all the way to Moscow, opened a new campaign in France today to block the rearmament of Germany finally approved in Thursday's historic vote in the National Assembly.

The Communists—France's largest single party—plan to carry the fight outside the assembly hall. A wave of strikes, violent demonstrations and other disturbances is expected.

Communist newspapers and radios across Europe took their cue from Moscow and condemned the assembly vote as "contrary to the will of the French people," an example of "threats and blackmail"

so the United States and Britain, and "dirty double-dealing" by Premier Mendes-France.

The assembly's approval of rearmament by 287 votes to 260 was met by Communist deputies with bitter jibes and threats.

Party strategists will have to work fast, as Mendes-France plans to present the treaties approved by the assembly to the Council of the Republic—the upper house—by the end of January or early February.

He is expected to get a quick majority in the upper house. It will then only remain for President Rene Cole to put his signature to the treaties before the instruments of ratification are exchanged with other signatory powers.
