PROVINCIAL LEGISLATURE.

Mr. A. Peters Begins the Debate on
the Address.

FRIDAY, MAY 11.

This forenoon the House met at 11.45
and transacted the usual routine busi-
ness.

Mr. A. Peters then moved that the
House go into committee of the whole to
consider the draft address. In doing so
he spoke of the pleasure it afforded him
to be able to present an address in reply
to the Speech of a Liberal Governor. It
was also a pleasure for him because of
the fact that the men of this land were
standing shoulder to shoulder with the
men of other parts of the Empire and sac-
rificing their blood. He then proceeded
to point out that Canada never enjoyed so
much prosperity as it does at the present
time, which is in a large measure due to
the Liberals. For eighteen years the
Conservatives held power. But what did
they do? What public work can they
point to as theirs? He (Mr. Peters)
pointed with pride to the proposed Hills-
borough bridge and the New Prince of
Wales College as the work of the Liber-
als. And today, said he, they are
building an annex to the asylum, which
he was sorry to say was very necessary.
There was a medical superintendent at
the asylum who was specially trained,
and the patients were now making brushes
and doing work such as is done in other
asylums. During the Conservative regime
nearly all the taxes were raised from the
farmers. But the Liberals set about ob-
taining a revenue from other sources.
They actually raised \$21,000 from other
sources. For instance commercial men
now pay some \$4,000 towards our revenue,
and the other provinces are following
the Island's example in this regard. In-
surance companies, banks, etc., contribute
over \$4,000, and from income tax about
\$5,000 is obtained. From the liquor
dealers a revenue of something like \$8,000
is obtained. Before this tax was imposed
there were a great many places where
liquor was sold on all days.

Now there are only about 43
places where liquor may be obtained, and
the police have the traffic well in hand.
Then there is the Succession Tax which is
increasing every year. He believed that
revenue and expenditure this year would
pretty nearly meet. He thought the time
would soon come when the different dis-
tricts would attend to the repairs of roads
and bridges in their respective sections.
The sum spent each year on education
was upwards of \$125,000,—more
than the Province could afford. This ex-
penditure must be cut down. There are
too many schools, and the people know
this. There must be a reduction. Thirty-
seven or forty schools in this Island
would be sufficient. Several small schools
might be replaced by one large one. This
would mean a reduction in the number
of teachers, and there would be a conse-
quent decrease in the expenditure. Mr.
Peters then pointed out that the road
machine had done good work and con-
demned certain members of the Opposi-
tion for calling them "mud machines."
He also pointed out that the Government
was building an iron bridge at Murray
Harbor,—a work of great importance.
He predicted that in the near future the
Fishery Award would yield this Province
a snug sum—a sum sufficient to materi-
ally help lift it out of the rut of taxation.
He charged that the Conservative party
threw every obstacle in the way of send-
ing a Contingent to South Africa, but
thought that Laurier acted judiciously in
hesitating until he ascertained the feelings
of the people on the subject. Within a
fortnight after the matter was brought be-
fore Premier Laurier he had 1,000 men on
their way to South Africa. He charged
the Conservatives with saying that all
French-Canadians were disloyal, and de-
precatory of the raising of the racial cry.

Mr. Campbell rose to a point of order
and asked Mr. Peters to name one single
leading Conservative who said the
French were disloyal.

Mr. Peters said the Montreal Star raised
the cry.
Mr. Campbell asked Mr. Peters to pro-
duce the Star containing such statements.
Mr. Arsenault asked if Mr. Peters read
La Patrie, Mr. Tarte's paper.
Mr. Peters said he did not, and was
advised by Mr. Arsenault to do so.
Mr. A. J. Macdonald pointed out that
Mr. Peters had not given the names of any
Conservatives who had charged the French
with disloyalty.
Mr. Peters proceeded to refer to the war
in South Africa, and incidentally made
reference to the recent visit of the Queen
to Ireland. This latter circumstance, taken
in connection with the bravery displayed
by the Irish soldiers in South Africa,
meant much for the future of the empire.
It was, he said, a grand day when every
part of the British Empire volunteered
troops for service in South Africa. He
thought the day was not far distant when
Canada would be represented in the Brit-
ish House of Commons. Imperial Feder-
ation was not a dream. Speaking further
in reference to the war, Mr. Peters referred
in terms of praise to the celebrity with
which the people of the Island province
volunteered for service in South Africa.
He also made appropriate reference to
Lieutenant J. A. Macdonald, who had gone
to South Africa to join the first contingent
and was now at the front, having insisted
upon being sent there from Cape Town.
Mr. Peters had the floor at 1 o'clock
when the House adjourned until 3 on
Monday.

—It is announced that Mr. W. B. Mc-
Innis, M. P., is about to become a mem-
ber of the Martin Ministry in British
Columbia. Strange things happen under
the Liberals of these days. Mr. McInnis
is a son of the Lieutenant-Governor who
brought into existence the Martin Min-
istry. The Gazette remarks that his be-
coming his father's minister would sug-
gest reasons for some things that have
transpired on the Pacific Coast that other-
wise are unaccountable for, and they
would be bad reasons.

—Referring to the tactics of the Lib-
erals in respect to Mr. Wise and Mr.
Pineau, the Moncton Times says: "Such
tactics will, of course, react against the
party using them. Indeed, it is said
popular indignation is so great that it is
doubtful if a Liberal could now be elected
in a single one of the fifteen electoral dis-
tricts into which the Island is divided.
It is hoped, however, to hold on until
after the Dominion election; when, if the
Liberals succeed, the men who are now
bedeviling the politics of the province will
no doubt expect to be provided for at the
public expense."
