Crippled Children's Work Backed By Whipper Watson

Whipper Billy Watson yesterday visited Summerside in the interest of the Easter Seal campaign to aid crippled children, an interest which has become perhaps more important to him than wrestling, a career in which he excelled to win a world wrestling championship and the reputation that has made him a symbol of the best qualities not only of sport but also of citizenship.

His visit to Summerside revealed that the respect and admiration in which he is held by every school boy, extends also to many adults who professed a long-time fan following of his wrestling career.

Whipper Billy visited and spoke to school children at St. Mary's Academy and

land's "Timmy", Jimmy Schurman, and president of the Rotary Club John Arnold.

Summerside High School during the morning, and delighted the youngsters with an exhibition of wrestling holds interspersed with humorous commentary which kept the boys and girls laughing merrily.

His remarks also provided graphic descriptions of some of the unfortunate crippled children he has met who have overcome almost insurmountable physical handicaps to provide useful service and make their own living despite their physical disabilities.

SPEAKS AT ROTARY
Whipper Billy was guest of the Summerside Rotary Club at a noon luncheon where he reported in greater detail on the 90,000 crippled children who have to be cared for in Canada. He said that while the present age is thrilled by the news of rockets being sent into outer space, the finest news of the age for him was the discovery of the sick vaccine which can prevent young bodies from being twisted by polio.

Mr. Watson said that he would be visiting Springfield, N.S., to say a personal thanks for a mailing response of 85 percent to the Crippled Children's Fund which was the highest average for all of Canada despite Springfield's own hardships and disaster. He said it was nice to know there is that kind of people in Canada who are so ready and willing to help crippled children.

Although the response has been better than in previous years, the nation is only scratching the surface of the task that still has to be done for crippled children he said.

With Mr. Watson at the Rotary dinner was Jimmie Schurman the Prince Edward Island "Timmy" for 1959 representing the crippled children in this province.

VISITS MAYOR
Before proceeding to Charlottetown later in the afternoon Mr. Watson visited the office of Mayor W.A. Currie where he was officially welcomed to Summerside, his visit at the Mayor's office was simultaneous with one made by Miss Mary Chowna of Bombay, India, where she is a volunteer social worker among the blind, deaf, and dumb of that city.

Now on a world tour to study educational and health procedures that might be adapted in her native India, Miss Chowna, a spirited conversationalist on a wide variety of subjects, provided one of the most interesting acquaintances Mr. Watson is likely to meet on his tour. In addition to discussion on the special health problems with which she is concerned, Miss Chowna indicated considerable knowledge of wrestling in her native country and provided an interesting diversion for Whipper Billy, who had personally wrestled with several of the Indian wrestlers about whom she inquired.

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Volunteer Indian Teacher Visiting Schools In S' Side

SUMMERSIDE — Miss Mary Chowna, a volunteer teacher of the deaf, dumb and blind in India, is currently in Summerside completing an inspection tour of educational institutions in this province as part of her world tour in the interests of her native land.

Chiefly interested in schools for infirmed children, Miss Chowna has visited such institutions in Europe, the U.S. and other parts of Canada. She will stop at Japan on her trip back to India.

The Indian teacher, who says she speaks 15 languages, is associated with the Naigaum Social Service Centre and with the Dadar School for the blind in Bombay.

"Blindness caused largely by smallpox and cataracts is a public health problem in India," she says.

WIPES OUT VILLAGES
An epidemic of smallpox may wipe out an entire village in a day or two, the Indian woman said. When it attacks the stomach, it usually proves fatal and when the eyes are affected the victims become blind. There is only one doctor for each 70,000 persons. Even though there are free vaccinations it is impossible to protect everyone in a country of 450 million people.

In Miss Chowna's opinion, the brilliant year-around sunlight is the major cause of cataracts that afflict most people in India before they are fifty years old. Other authorities attribute the condition to faulty diets.

In Bombay there are five free hospitals exclusively performing operations for the removal of cataracts.

Even though 700 operations are performed daily, this service covers only a fraction of the serious cases.

Labor in Bombay is cheap with one ordinary worker making about twenty cents a day. Since fruit and vegetables are abundant they can be purchased at cheap prices. The extreme heat that reaches 120 degrees and the lack of refrigeration necessitates the practice of burning perishable foods including meats that are not sold before 10 a.m. each day. Stores open at 5 a.m. and housewives buy the day's needs early.

BURN LEFTOVERS
Special police are detailed to see that shop-keepers burn the "leftovers". In keeping with their religion, Hindus will not eat

MEAT BECAUSE, according to their belief in reincarnation, the animal might possess the soul of an ancestor or a future descendant.

For this reason, Miss Chowna explained, they also will not even eat an egg.

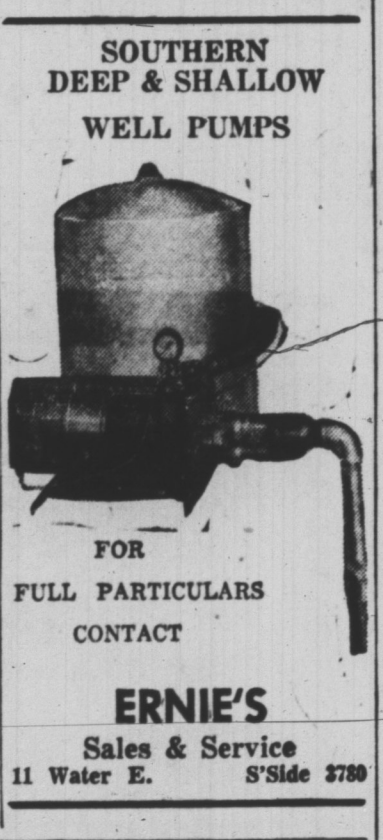
PROVINCE WIDE
He went on to say that artificial insemination has now spread province wide with 13 clubs being formed and over three thousand members.

The figures of the number of cattle bred artificially from 1956 to 1958 were: 1956—7333; 1957—11647; 1958—17394.

Dr. Fisher stated that artificial breeding in hogs has progressed but not enough for commercial use. "If this becomes practical it could play an important part in this province and give us a good market in Yorkshire hogs."

Another speaker Earl Adams of the Department of Agriculture, noted that Dairy Herd Improvement had made rapid progress on the island. There are now eight associations on the island. These are located in West Prince O'Leary, Tyne Valley, East Prince, New Glasgow, York, Montague, and East Kings.

Perry, president of the Catholic Women's League.

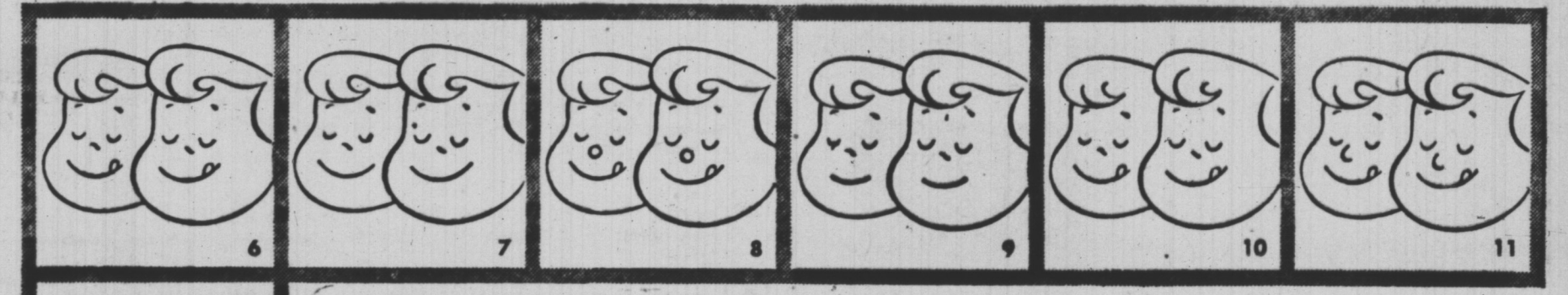
