NOTES AND COMMENTS.

The expected rush to the Klondike is not materializing. Boats are reported to be sailing from Seattle and San Francisco almost empty, and the railroads are still quarrelling over the small traffic to the coast cities. It is fortunate that it is so, for even the comparatively small number who have started have suffered greatly, and the hard-hips and loss of life would be vastly increased, even proportionately, had there been greater numbers to support.

According to an eminent German physician the consumers of tobacco run a risk in their indulgence of the weed. In a late English paper this physician states that after professional observations for many years of the mouth, teeth, stomach, lungs, heart and skin, devotees of tobacco should never smoke before breakfast, or when the stomach is empty. Neither, he says, should a person smoke during any exertion of great physical energy, as dancing, running, cycling, mountain climbing or rowing, and especially if in a contest. It is dangerous to allow smoke to pass through the nose, or to inhale smoke in any way. A pipe is the most wholesome form of smoking.

Canada has asked for 60,000 square feet of space in the Greater Britain Exhibition at Earl's Court in 1899, which is the exact space devoted to all the British Colonies, viz.: 35,000 square feet in the Colonial building and 25,000 square feet in the main building. If this is granted what will be done with Queensland, which asks 32,000 square feet, and South Africa, 14,500 feet, not to speak of the many other colonies, which will doubtless send in their applications yet? The demands on the space have given some trouble to the directors and they have made a proposal to the Premier of Canada that he should be officially represented at the Earl's Court Exhibition, where our wealth, resources, produce and manufactures would be brought before the public of the United Kingdom, and that the limited space that will be assigned to Canada at Paris should be occupied by a selection of the more important exhibits displayed at Earl's Court.

REWARDS FOR THE HEROES.

Medals and Promotion the Least They Can Expect.

WASHINGTON, June 10—Reward sure and adequate is awaiting the men who risked their lives on the Merrimac, and acting Secretary Allen has so pledged himself after consultation with Secretary Long. Medals and promotion are the least they can expect from a grateful people. Moreover, they will not languish in a Spanish prison if the authorities here can bring about their release, for half an hour after Admiral Sampson's bulletin was displayed on the walls of the Navy Department, Col. Carter, assistant adjutant-general, and taken the preliminary steps to arrange for an exchange of prisoners, and was learning just how many Spanish officers and enlisted men were still held in captivity at Fort McPherson, Ga., where they had been taken from the prizes captured by the American naval vessels. In addition to these, the navy has turned over to the military authorities at Fort Monroe for safe keeping another Spanish officer supposed to be of high rank, but who has so far managed to conceal his identity. The officials are confident they have more than enough Spanish officers to offer as ransom for the one American officer and seven enlisted men held by Cervera.

The Old Man Was Cured.

"Talk about curing people of bad habits, one of the funniest cases I ever knew occurred on the south side some years ago," said Detective Thomas McQuaide. "There was an old fellow over there who would insist on fussing with his wife, who would invariably give him the worst of it. Then he would run up stairs and hang out of the second story window, holding to the ledge, shouting like wildfire that he was going to drop and kill himself. Of course the wife would relent and set up a noise that would bring out the neighbors for blocks, and the man would be pulled in the window by friends.

"This got to be coming too frequently, and some of the boys who lived near, and who had lessened several joints in their spines at different times pulling him in, decided to stop it. One fine day it came again. The old fellow hung out of the window, shouting that he would surely jump and end it all; the wife came rushing into the street in hysterics, and the neighbors ran as before to pull him up. The first man who got there hit the man's fingers with a stick, making him loosen his hold, and, to the horror of all, he dropped to the hard pavement with a howl that was pitiful. He was not badly hurt, but it cured him of that bad habit."—Pittsburg Dispatch.
