Freight Rates Stability Seen

Until investigation of the Atlantic Provinces transportation problems is completed, there should be no move by federal authorities to increase freight rates, said Premier Walter R. Shaw Monday.

A transportation study was announced by Transport Minister Pickersgill in Ottawa last week. The premier said he was "alarmed at the suggested time element—18 months apparently before the investigation would take place."

Premier Shaw said "I feel that in the meantime, no move

should be made that will increase freight costs in the Atlantic Provinces, as a result of the MacPherson Royal Commission recommendations. No move should be made in applying increased rates until the proposed investigation is completed.

"An increase would be a very serious matter for provincial producers. We have products of a heavy nature and not of high value to sell in distant markets. If increased rail tariffs had to be met it would be a bad blow to our economy."

Federal Spending Poorly Allotted Says Chamber Of Commerce Pres.

The president of the Canadian Chamber of Commerce yesterday charged that federal government spending is poorly allotted, as he addressed the regular dinner meeting of the Charlottetown Rotary Club.

Arthur J. Little, F.C.A. who is chief spokesman for over 850 boards of trade and chambers of commerce, said: "We have been frankly disappointed that the government seems to have given higher priority in its spending program to welfare measures rather than to education. We have thought that the right priority in these particular items ought to be education, health and pensions in that order."

Mr. Little, discussing the role of government in a competitive enterprise system, said that government will have to make policies and programs to stimulate the growth of business, and make sure the Canadian people know what the policies are.

LONGER TERM

"We believe the government should formulate and indicate programs and policies that will be applied over the longer term on such things as trade, expenditure programs, social welfare programs, social capital, fiscal and monetary policy.

"The more we know about how government purposes to influence the general economic climate, the easier it will be for

private business and other private groups to plan their affairs and to move ahead," he said.

He expressed disapproval of the Canada Pension Plan, noting that "in the initial years of building up funds there will be little payout."

This will have the effect of taxing the people and accumulating a fund with no stimulation to consumer spending. This is not an expansionary program, and surely we will require expansionist policies if its goals are to be achieved."

FIVE CHIEF GOALS

The goals, he explained, are sound social security measures, increased economic understanding, strengthened national unity, and sound community development.

The Toronto accountant criticized government budgeting methods.

"One does not freely choose what one would like to spend and then demand the appropriate income from one's employer, nor does business design its product, add up its costs and

then set the price without any regard to competition or what the market will bear. I think the time really has come when the same principle as adopted in the sensible household should be adopted by government," he commented.

Mr. Little, born in London, Ont., is a gold medal graduate in business administration from the University of Western Ontario, (1955) and a partner in the Toronto accounting firm of Clarkson, Gordon and Co.

Active in community affairs, he is a trustee of the Toronto General Hospital, a governor of York University, and past president of the Toronto Board of Trade and the Toronto Community Chest.

Officer Cadet Gets Greenwood Appointment

John E. Norton, an officer cadet in the primary reserve of the Royal Canadian Air Force, has received notice that he will be on the Camp Staff at RCAF Station Greenwood this summer.

Officer Cadet Norton is an instructor attached to No. 60 Charlottetown Squadron of the Air Cadets. He will be entering the Arts course at St. Dunstan's University this fall. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. John Norton of 12 Falconwood Drive, Sherwood.

O.C. Norton will report for duty on July 1 and probably will be involved in air cadet training at Greenwood until the end of August.

Pownal Men Developing Giant Piggery Operation

What is probably the largest pig raising operation in the province—certainly it is one of the largest—is being developed at Alexandria where "Chris" and Donnie Judson and Charles Smith, Pownal, have a building underway that will be 204 feet in length by 36 feet in width. It will house a laminated, after roof-it will be covered with corrugated steel—and it will be sheathed inside with plywood and insulated with rock wool.

The rafters are being made from four-inch boards, seven inches deep. They are shaped in place by machines. The idea for the rafters was provided by Tom Curran, M.L.A. who showed the Judson-Smith combination how to build them.

The idea for the building type was garnered from Emmett Powers, Greenfield, who uses his building for loose housing of cattle during the winter months.

ALL MODERN DEVICES

The building will incorporate just about every modern labor-saving device that's available when it's completed, it was learned from Mr. Jones.

The feed intake will be controlled with drops in each pen—the feed will fall onto the floors—controlled by metres that are operated directly by a time-

clock arrangement. The controlled feeding operation will produce more Grade A carcasses the owners believe, though they are not so sure that it will lessen cost of feeding, as some operators believe.

There are 100 pens, each four feet wide by 16 feet long, and the feed metres permit individual pen control. Normally there will be 10 pigs to a pen, at least if they have attained a certain size, but the feed drop can be curtailed when the number per pen is reduced below 10, because of some 1925 that have been marketed earlier than others, it was explained.

No bedding will be used and the manure will be liquefied and washed into a covered tank which measures 20 feet by 36 feet, by seven feet deep. The liquid manure will be spread on the land by a tank truck with a "baffle" spreader.

There will be no windows in the large building and ventilation will be controlled by fans. Three fans will be in constant operation, and the other seven will be controlled by thermostats.

It is much harder to control ventilation in a building with windows, Mr. Jones explained. And the problem of tail-biting is much more serious.

Though there will be electric

lights which can be turned on for working in the building, the place will be comparatively dark most of the time. The animals do not bite nearly as much, it was explained, when the buildings are kept dark.

Much of the labor will be accomplished by the automatic equipment, but pens will have to be scraped down, among other chores that still call for man labor.

The idea of the long, narrow pens is for sanitation, Mr. Jones told The Guardian. The upper part of the pens, where the feed is dropped, will be fairly level. The remainder of the pen floor space slopes more sharply to the outer perimeter.
