DOMINION PARLIAMENT

Summary of Proceedings.

OTTAWA, March 11.

Hon. John Haggart introduced a bill to amend the Civil Service Acts. He explained the amendment, which includes a reduction of the salaries of the Civil Service Examiners, exempt from the operation of the Civil Service Act post office inspectors, and provides for the payment of mileage for the chief mail clerks when travelling.

Sir John Thompson introduced a bill to amend the Copyright Act. This provides that publication or re-publication in Canada within three months of work copyrighted elsewhere shall be necessary, in order to obtain a copyright here.

Mr. Wilson, of Elgin, introduced a bill to amend the act respecting threats, intimidation, and other offences. The bill provides, he explained, that no prosecution shall be maintainable against any person for conspiracy in refusing to work with or for any employer or workman, or for doing any act or causing any act to be done for the purpose of a trade combination, unless such act is an offence punishable by statute.

Sir Hector Langevin, answering Mr. Perry, said that the Government could not say whether or not the Government of P. E. Island has given up all future claims against the Government of Canada for non-fulfilment of the terms of Confederation or otherwise for the subsidy of \$70,000 a year.

In answer to Mr. Edgar, Sir Hector Langevin said it was the intention of the Government to provide for the holding of the North-west elections by ballot.

The Minister of Justice gives notice to-night of bills to amend the Exportation Act, to amend the act relating to the House of Commons, to amend the Summary Trials Act, to amend the Summary Conviction Act and to amend the law respecting the Exchequer Court.

Representatives of the Toronto Board of Trade are here working against Wallace's anti-combine movement.

A delegation from St. John arrived in the city to-day to urge upon the Government the desirability of making that city the winter port for the Atlantic steamships.

The Weavers' Strike.

FALL RIVER, Mass., March 11. The weavers strike for advance in wages, which occurred this morning, is one of the most general in the history of labor troubles here. The weaving departments of fifty mills are practically shut down, and about six thousand weavers are idle.

Must Be Insane.

WATFORD, Ont., March 11. Albert Wilson shot and killed Sarah Marshall last night because she refused to allow him to walk home with her from church. He then set fire to a straw stack to draw off attention from his track. He is still at liberty.

New Line of Steamers.

LONDON, March 11. The English and Canadian Governments have arranged to subsidize a new line of steamers to run between Liverpool and Japan, via Vancouver.

WASHINGTON, March 11. No news has been received to-day at either the Department of State or Navy about Samoan matters.
