Claude Ives stated that there was pressure being applied for an out of town shopping center and felt this could become a reality if the downtown parking situation was not rectified in the immediate future.

Creelman MacArthur, one of the members of a committee working towards the provision of additional parking explained the progress being made by the committee and stated it had run into a few problems which he

Mr. Fisher opened by saying, "If there is any lack of public interest in this field it is because the public is not aware of the need. We must not confuse mental retardation with mental illness," the speaker said.

"Many parents up to a few years ago were told to put their retarded children away as nothing could be done for them," he said. "Despite this only 8 to 10 per cent could be accommodated in places of confinement at that time."

(Continued from page one) MP for Kings, he was advised that the causeway will be completed on schedule but that some of the work may be rescheduled to summer to alleviate winter unemployment.

Highways Minister Philip Matheson said he was disappointed with the attitude of the opposition leader. "I thought," said Mr. Matheson, "that with his youthful energy he would fight for the rights of the province and not accept compromise. "I am surprised he has fallen in line so quickly and some as-

stant in Ottawa can put the whip on him and bend him down to conform. "We have a crises facing us in our transportation system and with the causeway delay, and we cannot consider it in any other light, there is going to be a drastic delay in a project that may extend many years."

Mr. Matheson suggested that the "little impact" delaying the causeway will have an inflation "is so small we should not recognize it. The opposition should fight this thing."

Welfare and Labor Minister Hubert MacNeill said it is "a sad day" for the province, not because of the slowing down of the causeway project, but because the leader of the opposition "made such a wishy-washy" speech on the resolution.

FARMS NEED CAUSEWAY Agriculture Minister Andrew MacRae said the farm population needs the causeway for moving produce to markets. "We are getting second class service now," he said. Provincial Treasurer Albian Farmer said any delays in the causeway would be hard for business people to accept. He said many have plans to co-ordinate business operations with the scheduled opening of the causeway and delays could cause frustration and losses.

Former opposition leader Alex Matheson said "let's get this out of politics." He suggested that if the people of Canada are not in favor of the causeway "we cannot kick them; we have to do something else."

PEOPLE FED UP "I'm also convinced that a small percentage of our 106,000 people don't give a damn about the causeway. Some don't want it at all. It's time it was out of politics and if any member of
