

RESULT :COUNCIL ELECTIONS FOR SEPT 28

The Student Union By-elections will be held Wed. Sept. 28th. The student council made that decision at their first meeting on Sun. Sept. 11th. The positions open are President, 2 Senators, 1 Board of Governors plus one education representative. Nominations open Wed. Sept. 14th and close Sept. 21st.

As the position of Chief Electoral Officer was vacant, Council decided to appoint one immediately. Communications Officer Mike Mahon telephoned last year's Electoral Officer Sue Hornby and requested that she fulfill the position. She agreed and council passed the appointment.

The Day Care Center has been moved from the Barn to Marian Hall. Renovations consisted of a fire escape, door, staging and a closet being built for the day care. The student union newspaper has been moved to fourth floor Main Building adjacent to CIMN. The yearbook photo club plus lab are expected to be situated in Main building as well. The University administration will provide the Student Union with \$1000. for the costs of the various re-locations and renovations.

Concern was expressed over the University administration attempting to not come under the jurisdiction of the Landlord and Tenant Act. Student Union lawyer John Carr will be invited to a future council meeting

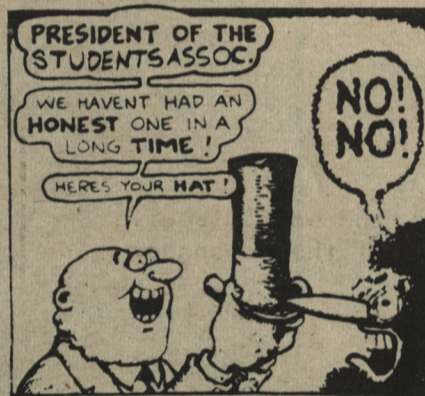
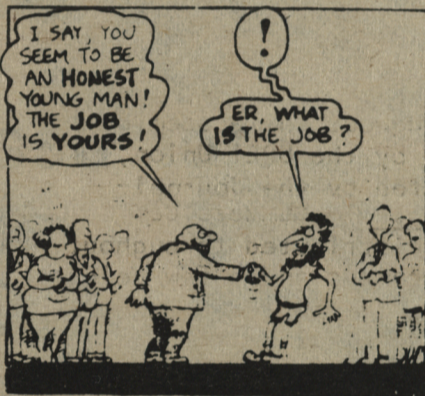

In a statement late Wednesday afternoon, Gerald McKenna, acting President of the UPEI Student Union, announced that he was resigning his position on the Executive. Mr. McKenna went on to say that his reason

for resigning was that he was planning on running in the upcoming by-elections for the position of President.

Mr. McKenna was chosen as Comptroller of the Union last November following the

resignation of Terry Parsons. He then ran for the position of Vice-President in the General elections in February, was elected and took over this position immediately due to the resignation of Paul Currie as V.P. Mr. McKenna then took over as acting President for the summer months on May 1st due to the resignation of Derek Key as President. Mr. McKenna stated that his resignation was necessitated by the fact that he could not be nominated for an Exec. position while he was already holding another position.

Nominations for the by-elections opened Wed. Oct. 14 and close Wed. Oct. 21st. Mr. McKenna's resignation is effective Tues. Sept. 20.

Derek Key, ex- Student Council president, resigned from the presidency after a term of only one month. He was elected into office April 1977 and was the first UPEI Student Union president elected for a second term.

In his letter of resignation to the speaker of the Student Council, Key cited lack of cooperation between council members and members of the council executive as the reason behind his early departure.

Although, supported by an "excellent" executive, Key said, "at the end of a meeting, where supposedly each of us are to be working for the benefit of the union, a group of councillors pride themselves in defeating resolutions proposed by the executive."

Key's resignation took effect May 1. He has been helping out vice president and acting president, Gerald McKenna, whenever need be.
