Begin Operation To Separate Siamese Twins

WELLSBORNE, Aug. 9—(Reuters)—Surgeons today began a series of operations to separate Siamese twin girls.

The girls, joined end to end by the top of their heads, were born five months ago in Tasmania.

After the first operation their condition was reported as "satisfactory."

The surgeons said they will have to cut through bony structure to within a fraction of an inch of the brain of each child—described as one of the most delicate operations in medical history.

The twins, Kathleen Rose and Lexie Irene, were born to Mr. and Mrs. Erskine Smith at Natone, Northern Tasmania.

This type of formation, known as symmetrical-inclusion, is rare and few survive birth. Most Siamese twins have heads pointing in the same direction.

The babies have been bottle-fed on much the same diet as their mother used for her other five children.

They have separate personalities. Kathleen Rose is darker and livelier than Lexie Irene.

The Smiths have refused to have the twins commercialized. Press photographs and newspaper pictures of them have been banned by the Commonwealth movie censor.

"It would be wicked to make money out of the helpless babies," Mrs. Smith said.

Siamese twins Brenda and Beverly Townsend, born at Tofted, Alta, last November, died after being separated by surgery in an Edmonton hospital in May. The children were joined face to face at the abdomen. They had a common liver and their hearts were enclosed in a single membrane.

N. Y. Rainmaker Claims Success

NEW YORK, Aug. 9—(AP)—Dr. Wallace E. Howell, New York's \$100-a-day rainmaker, came right out and said it yesterday: "I have made rain."

It was the first time since his cloud-seeding operations began last March that Dr. Howell, a Harvard University professor, had claimed success.

He added quickly that his experiments probably have produced "very little" rain that wouldn't have fallen anyway. And he said he's checking his data to see if he accidentally dried up any clouds that would have become rain if left alone.

Dr. Howell has been sprinkling dry ice into the clouds from a plane over the Catskill Mountain region. He also has "winkled" the clouds with silver iodide smoke sent up from the ground.

The city hired him to make the six-month experiment at a time when its reservoirs were dangerously low. Now they're nearly full.

Made Long Range Plans For Attack

VATICAN CITY, Aug. 8—(AP)—North Korean soldiers now engaging American forces include some who fought with the Russians at Stalingrad, says a letter received from Korea by the Vatican's Congregation of Propaganda Fide (Propagation of the Faith).

The letter to the Congregation, which is in charge of missionary work, said preparations for the North Korean attack "were carefully made by the Russians, using soldiers of Korean origin who have been in Russian territory for decades."

Britain's position is that she recognizes Chinese sovereignty over Tibet on condition that full local autonomy is recognized.

Diplomatic quarters believe that Britain and India would be reluctant to become militarily involved with China over the Tibetan question.

Recent indications have suggested that, in the absence of material aid from the West, Tibet will not face a military conflict with China.

Tibet, proverbial Himalayan abode of peace on the "roof of the world," stretches 2,000 miles along the northern border of India. It also has a frontier with China, which for centuries has claimed Tibet as a Chinese Province.

A feudal theocracy with an area of about 465,000 square miles, Tibet has a population thought to number about 5,000,000. Religion, in the form of Lamaism, dominates life. One in every four male Tibetans is said to be a monk and there are more than 3,000 monasteries.

Montreal Actress Success On New York Stage

NEW YORK, Aug. 9—(CP)—Madeleine Sherwood chose the hard way to get a dramatic scholarship—the electric chair.

The former Montreal radio actress didn't really die for her profession, of course. But she played the role of a woman whose career ends in a prison electric chair and her acting won her a scholarship with the Dramatic Workshop of the New School, a New York acting academy.

"I got executed every night," she said in an interview. "I was dragged off the stage and the audience could hear me screaming as the current in the chair was turned on. It was all very exciting."

That was last fall. Miss Sherwood, whose name off-stage is Madeleine Thornton, has just completed a New York appearance at the President Theatre in a revival of "All the King's Men," based on Robert Penn Warren's novel about a dictator in the United States.

The revival was staged by the President Players at the same theatre where "All the King's Men" previously was put on in 1948. Critic Vernon Rice of the New York Post found the latest production disappointing, but had a good word for Miss Sherwood's performance.

He said "only Madeleine Sherwood (playing the role of the dictator's wife) and Scott Hale (enacting the part of the man who murders the dictator) seemed anything more than puppets trying to capture a mood."

The play in which Miss Sherwood was executed? That was "Machinal," by Sophie Treadwell, a grim drama of crime and its sequel.

Awarded Scholarship
"Thanks to my work in that play, Mr. Plicator (director of the New School), gave me a scholarship," the young actress said.

She has appeared in several other dramas, most of them staged by the Dramatic Workshop.

"I played the feminine lead in 'The Scapagoat,'" she related. "And also the main feminine part in an adaptation of Kafka's 'The Trial.' That also was a grim one."

"Then I had a part in 'The Burning Bush,' dealing with the trial some centuries ago of Jews in Hungary. And there was a leading feminine role in 'The Case of the Neglected Calling Card,' a play with a police station setting."

Miss Sherwood, who now lives in the United States, left Montreal 18 months ago and acted in various parts of this country before coming to New York last year.

Her Montreal radio appearances included several soap opera programs produced under the direction of Rupert Caplan, she said.

G. M. C. Dividend

NEW YORK, Aug. 9—(AP)—Directors of General Motors Corporation today voted stockholders an extra \$100,000,000 slice of the company's all-time record profits with a special dividend of \$250 a share.

The special payment is in addition to a \$150 dividend also declared on common stock, both payable Sept. 9 to shareholders of record Aug. 14. Payments of \$150 each also had been made in March and June.

The action was announced after the close of the New York Stock Exchange, but General Motors stock spurted on Pacific coast exchanges which still were open. Sales at San Francisco reached a high of 92 1-8 compared with a close of 89 5-8 in New York.

A statement from Alfred P. Sloan, board chairman, and C. E. Wilson, president, pointed out that the first half's record profits were made on record production, record employment, and with record payrolls. They said the increase in dividends will help keep the returns of stockholders since the war "more in line with the increased cost of living."

General Motors earnings the first half of this year totalled \$495,277,389—greatest for any corporation in United States history for a six-month period.

There is speculation that the fiscal year starting April 1 next will see defence costs soar to unprecedented peacetime heights, possibly about \$1,000,000,000, because production will be booming in such key lines as fighter planes, warships, radar and other vital equipment. New fighter squadrons will be formed and Canadians probably will be fighting or serving abroad.

No Decision On Revival Of Wartime Controls

OTTAWA, Aug. 8—(CP)—Revival of wartime controls on such things as prices, rents and wages depends on whether the Government decides that a national emergency exists as a result of the international situation. It was learned authoritatively today.

The Government will seek authority at the special session, now tentatively scheduled for late September or October, to reinstitute controls on basic materials used in the manufacture of war equipment. But no decision has been reached on the question of seeking authority to revive the type of controls that affected all Canadians through most of the Second World War.

Statutory authority exists for continuation of domestic rent control until the end of next April. It is the last of a lengthy list of wartime controls still in existence. Thus far the Government has not considered reversing its decision to let the Provinces impose and administer any further rental controls after May 1.

Saskatchewan and Newfoundland are the only Provinces now with their own rent controls.

Would Require Emergency
In normal times, the constitution places power over civil and property rights in the hands of the Provinces. The Federal Government can only assume such power when it declares that a national emergency exists.

As a result, in order to revive the most important of the wartime controls, the Government would have to declare that such an emergency does exist and would have to introduce new legislation at the next session providing for re-imposition of controls.

One government official said today that the question of changes in the country's economic and financial policies will depend on the international situation and the effect of accelerated defence and was production programs on the general life of the country.

Higher Taxes
Another official said there appears little doubt that taxes will be increased to cover the cost of the new defence program, which includes the recruitment of an armed brigade for use by United Nations in Korea or elsewhere.

But it was learned that no thought has yet been given to the presentation of a new budget, providing for increased taxation, at the special session. One official was of the opinion that the Government would present additional estimates of expenditures at the new session, but withhold the budget until toward the end of the current fiscal year.

At that time the Government would be in a better position to judge how much it will need in the way of additional revenues.
