

City Businessman Dies In Hospital

A.R. (Roddie) Gillis, one of Charlottetown's best known citizens, died Tuesday in the Prince Edward Island Hospital. He was in his 74th year.

Mr. Gillis was born in Hartsville, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Alexander Gillis. He came to Charlottetown in 1910 and attended business college.

He started with DeBios Brothers as a salesman in 1917, and was sales manager, and a director of the firm when he retired from the company in 1960.

Mr. Gillis purchased a farm in Powful for a hobby after he retired. But the call of the business world proved strong enough to lure him back and he was divisional manager of United Investment Limited from 1962 until the time of his death.

Two brothers, Rev. Angus and Norman, and one sister, Jessie, predeceased him.

Mr. Gillis is survived by his wife, the former Alice Macmillan. There is one daughter, Audrey, a son, Allison, and one grandson, Ronald.

Mr. Gillis was a former elder of Trinity United Church, a long time member of the church choir and a lifetime chairman of the church's music committee.

His baritone voice qualified him to become a charter mem-

ber of the Charlottetown Male Eight, some years ago.

He was also a member of The Charlottetown Club, the Gideon Society, a member of the Odd-fellows Lodge and a member of the board of trade, among other things in his busy lifetime.

The funeral will be held on Thursday, May 19 at 2.30 in the afternoon. Interment will be in the People's Cemetery.

Prince County Grand Jury Returns Two 'True Bills'

A Grand Jury yesterday returned true bills in the only two cases on the spring session of Supreme Court here. The session opened at 11 a.m. with Mr. Justice R.R. Bell presiding.

In the case of the Stirling Joseph Bernard, Lennox Island, facing separate charges of manslaughter and causing bodily harm with intent to wound, true bills were found on both charges.

The charges arose from the death of another Lennox Island resident, Roger Labbe, on the night of September 26, 1965. Bernard was originally charged with capital murder, but the charge was later reduced to manslaughter.

The charge was laid prior to Mr. Silliker's death earlier this year in Nova Scotia. On being arraigned before the presiding judge, Gaudet entered a plea of not guilty and trial was set for Tuesday, May 26, upon request of the crown prosecutor, George R. McMahon.

REQUESTS ADJOURNMENT

Mr. McMahon asked for the adjournment in order to bring in two crown witnesses now residing in Toronto. The accused was released on bail of \$2,000 consisting of two sureties of \$1,000 each.

The members of the Grand Jury also brought in a number of recommendations following the inspection of the court house building and jail.

The recommendations were as follows: that an overhang be placed on the fence surrounding the recreation area of the jail; that the area on the north side of Court St. and east of the curling rink be made into a parking area for employees of the building; that the whole building be painted.

The jury also stated that the most serious condition noted during the inspection was the inadequacy of the electrical wiring. This condition, the report stated, would not be tolerated in any other building, adding that this is an emergency and should be corrected at once.

It was noted that the supreme court room floor "certainly needs attention, being badly worn and should be replaced with a modern floor. Also floors on the second floor need attention."

A recommendation was made that on new highway construction where no markings are up suitable signs should be displayed prominently to this effect, as well as some type of luminous markings should be placed as a temporary measure to indicate the centre of the highway until the white marking lines are placed.

A previous recommendation that a typewriter and desk be purchased for the sheriff's office was also endorsed.

Yesterday Mr. Justice Bell read the jailer's report which stated that 474 arrests had been made since the last sitting of the supreme court in November. Of this number 152 were committed to Prince County Jail for a variety of offences.

Of the 152 committed 66 were for drunkenness and eight were for impaired driving. "As you will notice," Mr. Justice Bell told the jury, "a large majority of these commitments are for the abuse of liquor."

Trade Commissioners Arrive Here Today

A group of eight Assistant Trade Commissioners, who will be touring parts of P.E.I., arrive in Charlottetown today. They are being trained by the Canadian Trade Commissioner Service of the Department of Trade and Commerce to take promotion jobs abroad.

Part of their initial training includes a tour of Canada to enable them to gain first-hand information on Canadian export trade so that they may be more informed when posted abroad.

The tour is also designed to provide a broader knowledge of the Canadian economy.

The eight assistant commissioners will arrive from Moncton this evening and will receive a briefing at the Charlottetown Hotel. On Thursday morning they will tour the Confederation Centre and the Legislature after which they will meet with the Hon. Lloyd MacPhail, minister of natural resources. They will tour Canada Packers and then have lunch at the Charlottetown Hotel.

Thursday afternoon they will travel to Georgetown where they will tour Bathurst Marine Ltd and Gulf Gardens Food plant. They will also visit a number of the Island beauty spots.

Friday morning they will tour Seabrook Farms Frozen Foods Ltd. at New Annan before leaving from Summerside at 10.50 a.m.
