

M'GILL CLOSING.

Addresses by Island Students - Degrees Conferred.

The McGill University Class Day proceedings have been concluded. The Arts Valedictory was delivered by Mr. Colin C. Ferguson who gave a short history of the class. He referred to the honors in athletics achieved by his associates, to the trouble with Laval, and complained about the gross unfairness of the newspapers which had tried to make political capital out of the occasion. He also referred to the reforms which were about to be inaugurated in the arts course, and complimented the juniors on the benefits they would derive therefrom. One thing that the artmen greatly needed, however, was a new building, which he hoped would be furnished before all the present classes had graduated. The government came in for a share of criticism for removing the small grant which the university had been receiving. He looked forward to the century about to commence being one of greater progress than the passing one, and hoped that some of the present graduating class would win renown that would last throughout its length. The satisfactory features of the revised Arts course were commented upon. At the planting of the class tree Mr. W. M. Forbes, of Arts 1900, son of Hon. Geo. Forbes, delivered the oration. The degree of B. A., has been conferred upon Colin C. Ferguson and Carrie E. Holman. S. J. Willis graduates with first rank honors and medal prize in mathematics and natural philosophy. Wm. Forbes takes second rank honors in geology, mineralogy and paleontology. Wm. V. Newson secures first rank honors in mathematics and natural philosophy.
