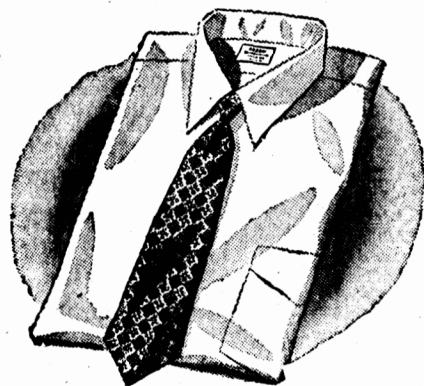

## C.W.L. Annual Report

The following report covering the year's activities of the Summerside Sub-Division of the Catholic Women's League, was given at the annual meeting recently by the recording secretary, Mr. Leo Wood.

Regular meetings, six executive meetings and one special meeting were held during the year with a good attendance at each of these meetings. To carry on the work of the sub-division funds were raised by the following means: Sponsoring the picture, "Fighting Father Dunn" at the Capitol Theatre; a collection from the parishioners which brought a very encouraging response; the annual dance, bingo, the annual card party, used clothing sale, lottery and vanishing card parties. A detailed and very gratifying report was given by the treasurer, Mrs. Carrol Delaney. Contributions were made to the following: Rt. Rev. Msgr. G. J. MacLellan for boys' school, St. Mary's Convent; Catholic Girls' Scholarship Fund, school prizes, Knights of Columbus in appreciation for use of their home, Kinsmen Club for Christmas Tree; A large part of the amount raised during the year was spent on social work.

Parcels of food and clothing were sent to St. Vincent's Orphanage and to the European Missions.

The president, Mrs. Malcolm Steele attended the annual convention, the P.E.I. Tuberculosis League meeting and a Red Cross meeting held in Charlottetown; also the Social Welfare convention at Dalway. Mrs. D. F. McNeill attended the Catholic Girls' Scholarship meeting held in Charlottetown. The following brief reports were submitted by the conveners of the various committees: Red Cross - Mrs. D. F. McNeill: 66 knitted garments and 30 other pieces of clothing were made by the league. Quite a number of the members assisted with the blood donor clinics by calling up donors and also by helping serve refreshments to the donors at the clinics. Education - Miss Ida Dawson: The usual prizes were donated both to St. Mary's Convent and The Summerside High School; \$100 to Rt. Rev. Msgr. G. J. MacLellan for boys' school; \$100 to Mother Superior, Convent school; \$100 to Catholic Girls' Scholarship Program and Entertainment. Mrs.

Laurier Peters. During the past year the most important feature in the way of entertainment by the League was the grade 10 convent Girls' Graduation Banquet and dance at Coyle's restaurant. This was highly successful and very much appreciated by the girls. There were 45 hostesses for the year who supplied delicious refreshments, which added much to the enjoyment of our meetings. Prizes - Mrs. Josephine Murphy: Reports of all C.W.L. meetings as well as other activities were prepared and sent to the local newspapers. In almost all cases these reports were used immediately and given conspicuous space. Sincere thanks to the Guardian, Journal and Pioneer for their co-operation at all times enabling us to advise the public of our activities. Newspaper publicity is an important element leading to the success of any organization as it is vital that people be made aware of what is being done before public support will be given to any activity that may be undertaken.

Sick - Mrs. Clarence Steele: Sick members were visited and several sympathy cards, get well cards and mass cards were sent.

Girl Guides - Mrs. Wilfred Perry: In the fall of 1949 both our companies were greatly handicapped by a scarcity of leaders. Miss McQuaid and Miss Glover with the help of the patrol leaders, carried on as best they could for a while. Both companies are now joined and are 38 Guides. Mrs. Fred Perry and Mrs. Alex Dunn came to the assistance of the overworked leaders and they are proving to be very keen and enthusiastic workers. At Christmas the Guides packed and distributed boxes to the needy. The Guides are now working on their different badges and the League is following their progress with interest.

Magazine - Mrs. Abel Arsenault: There are now seven subscriptions to the League Magazine.

Social Service - Mrs. Joseph Linkletter: Members of the League visited homes of the needy. Several articles of clothing were repaired and donated as well as \$142.70 spent on needy families.

Citizenship - Mrs. Dolor Richards is the representative in the Red Cross Society, Tuberculosis League, Local Association of Girl Guides, New Canadians Council, Home and School Group. The sub-division is sincerely interested in all that promotes better citizenship. —S
