

# Expect Sputnik 11 Will Fall From Space Today

**JODRELL BANK, England** (Reuters) — Sputnik II and its dead dog passenger probably will fall from outer space today—23 weeks after the launching.

Astronomer A. C. B. Lovell and a team of scientists at this Cheshire Observatory Friday swung the world's largest radio-telescope in a search of Sputnik II and figured its end was near.

Lovell said the Sputnik was picked up on telescope's radar and was visible to the naked eye late Thursday night. It then was taking 90 minutes to orbit the earth and its average distance away from earth was 175 miles.

By today — its 160th day in space — Sputnik's orbiting time should be down to 70 minutes, Lovell said. It probably will en-

ter the earth's atmosphere and burn up from friction, he said.

When the 1,110-pound satellite was launched Nov. 3, it took 103.7 minutes to complete an orbit some 1,000 miles up.

Vaporized in the Sputnik's fall would be the body of Laika, the husky-type dog that roused the sympathy of millions of dog-lovers throughout the world when it became the first living space-traveler.

**DIED IN SPACE**

Twelve days after the Sputnik was launched, Soviet scientists announced Laika had died "a painless death from a deficiency of oxygen."

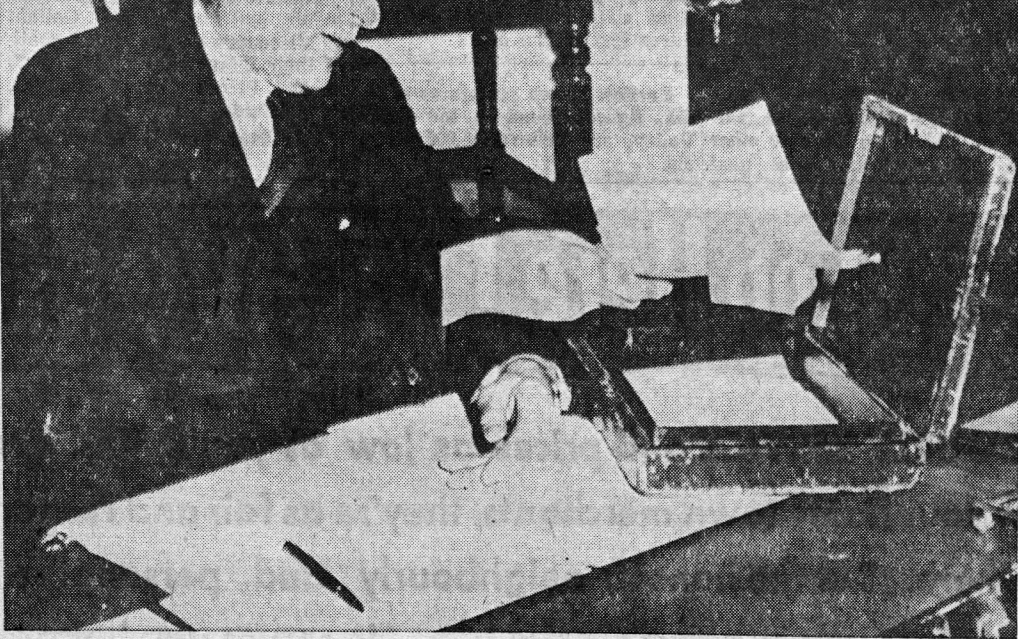
Long before Sputnik II and Laika were due to come down, Soviet scientists announced a pup-

named Alpha was being trained to travel in projected Sputnik III.

Sputnik I, a 184-pound sphere launched Oct. 4, entered the atmosphere and disintegrated in the first week of January. Sputnik II has spent six weeks longer aloft than did the first man-made earth satellite.

When Sputnik II comes down, three American satellites will have space all to themselves.

Two 30-pound U.S. Army satellites are still up — Explorer I, launched Jan. 13, and Explorer III, sent up 16 days ago. Explorer II came down soon after its launching March 5. The U.S. Navy's tiny Vanguard satellite made it into outer space March 17.

The sudden and unexpected death of Mrs. Mary Corcoran occurred at her home in Piusville on January 3rd, 1958. The former Mary Anne Kinch was born seventy-six years ago in Alma, the daughter of the late John Kinch and Elizabeth O'Brien.
