ment's proposed three-maple leaf design flag. He rejected the Canadian Red Ensign or the idea of holding a plebiscite or calling a federal provincial conference.

Opposition Leader Diefenbaker moved an amendment urging a national plebiscite. Speaker Ian Macnaughton ruled that separate Common votes will be taken on the maple leaf flag and the use of the Union Jack.

80-5 Name Petition Supports Recognition

OTTAWA (CP) — A petition bearing 17,833 names, mainly from Toronto and southern Ontario communities, was left at Prime Minister Pearson's office Monday urging a national plebiscite on the flag question.

The petition, sponsored by the emergency committee to save the Red Ensign, was brought to Ottawa by a delegation headed by Sherwood Sugden, Toronto publicist, and spread out on the Centre Block steps before going to Mr. Pearson's office.

Mr. Sugden, who said he was in his late 80s and who declined to reveal his political party sympathies, said the signatures came from people in every province and major city in Canada.

Continued from page 1 as they affect the school child, on the other. He called them "the two extremes of Canadian Christianity."

The Catholic child had a "heavenly family" of divine personalities performing "certain supernatural welfare services" for the individual. The Protestant child, seeing God as almost a "deceitful ancestor" through these welfare services as performed in the "historic past."

The Protestant child was less prone to appeal to a divine personality when faced with a difficult situation while the Catholic child was "inclined to rely more heavily upon his psychological rather than his real worldly reference groups as a basis for orientation and self definition."

However, the Catholic child probably would enjoy a "richer and more extensive intuitive life" than the Protestant who is more restricted by concepts of his own other human life.

The Protestant child approaches all truths with doubt and skepticism "since no authority but personal experience is acceptable." There is a consistency between the values and those of science, the 44-year-old sociologist said.

ART, RUBBISH, VIEWS DIFFER

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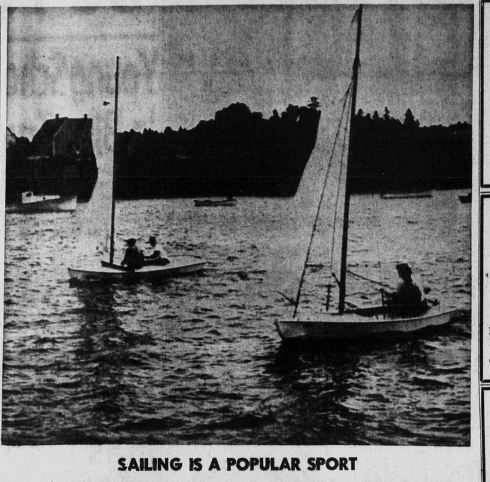
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
