RIPLEY'S BELIEVE IT OR NOT



CONTRACT BRIDGE

South dealer. Neither side vulnerable. NORTH: ♠ 10 8 3, ♥ A J 10 9, ♦ 7 6 5 2, ♣ 8 6 2. WEST: ♠ K 6 3, ♥ Q 4 2, ♦ 7 5, ♣ Q 8 4 2. EAST: ♠ 9 7 5 4, ♥ K 8 6 2, ♦ Q 10, ♣ K 7 5. SOUTH: ♠ A Q J, ♥ 7 5, ♦ A K 9 4 3, ♣ A 6 3.

The bidding: South West North East 1 ♠ Pass 1 ♥ Pass 2 NT Pass 2 NT

Opening lead—four of clubs. You sometimes hear bridge players refer to technique in dummy play. You also hear people refer to percentage plays. Very frequently these expressions are interchangeable because the percentage play is an evidence of good technique, and vice versa.

A great many players erect a mental block as soon as either expression comes into discussion, perhaps because the terms are a little too highfalutin, or because the subject seems to require exceptional knowledge. But these very same players make use of percentage plays practically all the time, though they may not recognize their actions by these terms. A simple case of good technique that would be practiced by almost anyone is offered in the accompanying hand. A club is led and continued, declarer not taking the ace until the third round. The purpose is to exhaust East of clubs, so that if he later obtains the lead he will not have a club to return. South now cashes the A-K of diamonds, the suit breaking favorably. South can then count eight winners. He has a choice, in an effort to obtain a ninth trick, of finessing in spades or in hearts. But the spade finesse, if chosen the disadvantage, if it loses, of permitting West to cash his established clubs. It seems more sensible to play in a manner which shoots straight for the goal and yet avoids West, the danger hand, in the process. So declarer leads a heart towards dummy and, when West plays low, finesses the nine, East wins with the king and returns a spade. South, consistent with the original plan to avoid West, and playing for split heart honors, goes up with the ace. He then repeats the heart finesse, which this time wins. As it happens, the ace of hearts then drops the queen—the jack becomes an additional trick, and declarer makes four notrump. The percentage play succeeds. Declarer exercised the best dummy technique. Maybe he doesn't know the correct terminology for the course of play he adopted. But a rose by any other name smells just as sweet.

Denmark's King Said Recovering

COPENHAGEN (CP)—Doctors reported Monday night that the condition of 59-year-old King Frederik of Denmark was "quite satisfactory" and that damage to his lung was healing. An official bulletin said the king's condition "has in the last few days been checked repeatedly with x-ray examinations, which have shown the collapsed lung is beginning to expand again." This is the first time the term "lung collapse" has been used officially to describe the king's illness. He has been confined to his bed at Amalienborg Castle since Dec. 26, when he was flown back in an ambulance plane from the royal hunting lodge in Jutland.

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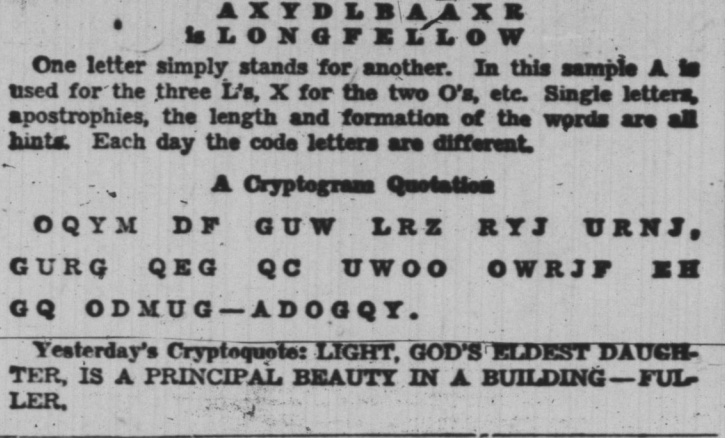
