Molson Breweries Decide Not To Merge With U.S. Firm

MONTREAL (CP)—Molson Breweries Ltd. announced it has called off its announced merger with the Hamm Brewing Co. of the United States because of threatened anti-trust action by the U.S. justice department.

Senator Hartland Dem Molson president of the Montreal-based brewery said in a statement that, in view of the justice department stand, the company had decided the merger with Hamm Brewing is not in the best interests of shareholders.

The \$80,000,000 merger, announced Jan. 5, had been approved by shareholders of both companies Hamm is based in St. Paul, Minn. and is the eighth-largest brewery in the U.S.

Senator Molson said his company had been informed by the U.S. justice department that, in its view, the merger would give Molson "an unduly dominant market position in certain areas of the United States" and thereby reduce competition within the industry.

Molson, on the other hand, felt the merger would "maintain and, in fact, intensify" competition, the senator said.

"Despite our making the strongest representations to this effect," he said, "the department of justice is adamant in its stand that, if the merger is consummated, it will institute legal proceedings against our company."

Gregoire Arrest Labelled Correct

OTTAWA (CP)—The Commons actions and privileges committee has reported the arrest of Gilles Gregoire (Creditiste - Lapointe) on traffic charges Feb. 12 was "entirely correct."

The committee said it is convinced after hearing eight witnesses that the three RCMP officers who arrested Mr. Gregoire on Parliament Hill did not act in a "shameful and brutal way" as the MP charged in a question of privilege in the Commons Feb. 15.

The committee report, tabled in the House by chairman Maurice J. Moreau (L.-York-Scarborough), denied Mr. Gregoire's arguments that his arrest violated MPs' immunity from arrest at the Parliament Buildings and his language rights.

The summonses served on Mr. Gregoire to appear in Carleton County magistrate's court were translated into French by the RCMP, the report added.

Other court documents in the case not intended for Mr. Gregoire were written in English only in accordance with the laws of Ontario.

Here is a wonderful hand played in the annual Intercollegiate Bridge Championship in 1963. Par on the deal was for South to bid seven notrump and make it.

Certainly South is entitled to bid the grand slam after he learns, by using Blackwood, that North has the missing ace. Thirteen tricks seem to be practically certain.

But if South is not careful in the play, he winds up behind the eight ball, which is where most of the declarers wound up when they played the hand.

The first test comes at trick

one. Declarer should win the spade lead in dummy with the ace and then cash the queen, discarding the ace of hearts.

Having made these two plays, declarer should next cash the K-Q of hearts, discarding the A-K-Q of clubs.

When declarer now plays the jack of clubs, catching the ten, all of dummy's clubs become good and South easily makes the rest of the tricks.

However, let's suppose that declarer plays the hand in less spectacular fashion, winning the first trick in his hand and attempting to run the diamonds. In such a case he goes down one because it turns out that West has all four missing diamonds.

The hand demonstrates an important principle of play. When dummy first appears, South can see that the contract is sure if the diamonds are divided normally, that is, 2-2 or 3-1. His one concern should therefore be a 4-0 break.

To protect against this possibility, South plays the hand in the manner advised. If the diamonds turn out to be divided normally, no harm will come from the recommended plays. But if, as in the actual case, the diamonds are badly distributed, South gives himself an extra chance by relying on the club suit secondarily. The fact that the ten of clubs drops is neither more nor less than poetic justice.

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Soviet Union May Replace Canada In Pakistan Deal

KARACHI (Reuters)—Russia instead of Canada may build a nuclear power station in Pakistan. Canada recently approved a loan of 51,000,000 for the project.

Reliable sources here said a dispute with the Canadian General Electric Company over the cost of building the station had forced the deputy chairman of Pakistan's planning commission, Said Hasan, to look elsewhere for assistance.

Hasan received Soviet Ambassador Alexei Nesterenko Friday to discuss terms for Soviet credit.

The sources said negotiations with Russia had been going on for some time and it was hoped terms and conditions would be settled before President Ayub Khan's visit to Moscow early next month.
