TRADE STATISTICS.
A Falling off in Revenue.

INCREASED IMPORT OF FREE GOODS.
Great Addition to Export Trade.

OTTAWA, Sept. 1.—The imports of the past year show an increase of \$800,000. But the duty collected shows a decrease of \$300,000.
The dutiable imports fell off one million dollars, and the free goods increased \$2,250,000. The imports of sugar went up from \$4,750,000 to \$7,500,000.
There are large decreases in the importation of cloths and dress goods.
The exports increased \$16,000,000, as follows: Produce of mines, over \$3,000,000; Produce of forest, \$4,000,000; animals and their produce, \$2,500,000; agricultural products, \$7,000,000.

SHOOTING AT OTTAWA.
Results of Several Matches.

OTTAWA, Sept. 1.—The Dominion Association Rifle shooting was continued yesterday. In the Minister of Militia's match the first prize was won by Private Blakely, of the 7th, with a score of 66 points. The first team prize was won by the 13th Hamilton, with a score of 292 points. The Dominion of Canada match was also won by the 13th, Hamilton.
In the Dominion of Canada match Capt. H. M. Davison won ten dollars by a score of ninety points. In the Minister of Militia match Lieut. J. M. Davison won ten dollars with a score of sixty-three and Sergeant-Major Baird four dollars with a score of fifty-seven points. The P. E. Island team is well up in the aggregate.

LATEST NEWS BY WIRE AND MAIL

TACOMA, August 30.—The Japanese steamer just in brings news verifying the report of the severe earthquakes in Japan on August, 5, followed by a tidal wave and great floods. A thousand houses were inundated and 200 persons were killed and injured. Sixty five Chinese villages were inundated. According to a Tokio despatch dated 16th of July, it is reported that next year's budget will show a deficiency of 25,000,000 yen. The deficit is chiefly due to the extraordinary expenditure sanctioned by the diet. The Shanghai Shepo contains a letter from its Foo Chow correspondent, who reports that the Bubonic plague in the larger cities and suburbs is most serious and the people are dying rapidly. The proclamation of the government of the Philippine islands offering a free pardon to penitent rebels who surrendered has now been recalled.

ANOTHER QUEER DISCRIMINATION.

Mail and Empire: The government has ordered that foreign goods, to receive the benefit of the preferential tariff rates, must be imported direct.
This is a discrimination against British shipping and British ports.
But the scheme also discriminates against Canadians.
A very large buyer abroad can import direct from Germany or Belgium.
He receives a tariff discount of twelve and a half per cent. now, and twenty-five per cent later on.
But a smaller buyer has his foreign packages sent to England for transportation, or he buys his foreign goods at an English wholesaler's house.
Messrs Fielding and Patterson deny him the discount, and make him pay a full tariff rate.
The system is a direct discrimination in favour of the large buyers.
This is a great government.
