

**Saints Stage Great Comeback**

**Davey's Late Goal Gives Saints 5-4 Win Over BYC**

Paul (Buck) Davey's tie-breaking goal at the 18:40 mark of the third period clinched a terrific S.D.U. comeback and gave the Saints a close 5-4 victory over the tottering Basilio Youth Club in an Island Senior League game at the Sports Arena last night.

Paying listless and uninspired hockey in the first period the Saints found themselves trailing by a 3-0 score going into the second. Whatever coach A.J. MacAdam had to say to them between periods they apparently took to heart and outscored the B.Y.C. 5-1 the rest of the way.

Paul Davey was everywhere, scoring a pair of third period goals and setting up another. His first marker tied the score at 3-3 in the third. After the B.Y.C. had pulled in front 4-3 seconds later Davey engineered a goal by line mate Ed MacDonald and fired the winner himself with 20 seconds more than a minute to go in the game.

Only four penalties were called by referees Don Whelan and Brian MacCallum. All went to the B.Y.C. and two of them cost the youth clubbers dearly. Stu MacLure was tagged with 3 of the infractions and Jack MacDonald and Ray Gionet scored during two of them.

Bill Wilson, Brian Lewis, Stu MacLure and Lloyd Shepherd each scored one for the B.Y.C.

Both goaltenders, Shepherd and John Gehrke for the B.Y.C. came up with some great saves during the 20 minute, with Gehrke particularly rising to high heights as he stopped Davey on a clear break away in the early minutes.

S.D.U. MOVE UP

The Saints came out of their shell and began to move along in the second, although they missed some great scoring chances before Jack MacDonald finally counted at 11:17. The goal came from a scramble in front of the net after Gehrke made a sensational save off Louis MacDonald who fired from about 15 feet out. Two or three players took swats at the rebound but it was Jack MacDonald who picked it out of the pileup and backhanded it behind the B.Y.C. goalie.

At the time MacLure was sitting out a penalty for high sticking and he had just stepped on the ice after serving out his third penalty. This time for cross-checking when Ray Gionet got the Saints back in the game from Roy and Veilleux.

That goal made 4-3 and that is the way the period ended.

The third period - the first penaltyless period of hockey in league play to date as all Buck Davey's. The fast skating right winger evened things up at 3-3 at 5:18 when Kayo Mullins broke up a B.Y.C. power attack and sent him away at center with one on all between him and Gehrke.

However the youth club regained its 1-goal lead only 22 seconds later when Lloyd Shepherd behind Merrill Pineau's passout slipped his brother Earl in the S.D.U. cage.

Ed MacDonald shot the goal that tied the game once again at 13:53.

**Win Game 5-0 Shirley Blanks Moncton Hawks**

SAINT JOHN, N.B. (CP)—Goalie Jim Shirley gained his seventh shutout of the Atlantic Coast Senior Hockey League season when the leading Saint John Beavers whitewashed Moncton Hawks 5-0 Tuesday night.

He was called upon to make only 17 saves while Beavers kept Nick Pidsodny hopping with 51 shots in addition to the five he missed.

Saint John sandwiched three second period goals between lone tallies in the first and third. Wimpy Jones scored two. The others were shot by Lloyd Hinchberger, Nick Nicolle and Wally Kullman, the latter assisted shortly after helping Jones.

Beavers were outnumbered 14 to 11 and had only two forward line. They worked without Sid Puddicombe, Gerry Smith and Ron Rubic. Puddicombe, with a torn knee cartilage, will undergo an operation and is expected to be out of hockey action the rest of the season. Smith has a bruised leg.

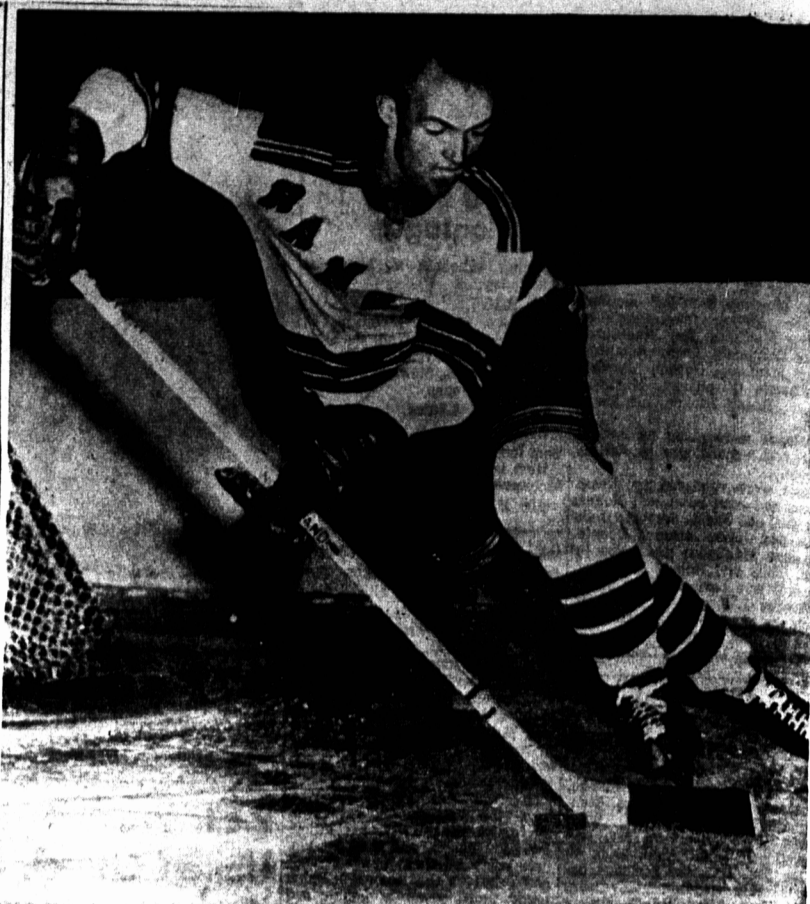

His league leading record to date for 9 games played is 25 goals and 11 assists. His goal scoring record is far and away the best in the league, averaging something close to 3 goals per game. Not counting last night's B.Y.C. S.D.U. game his closest rivals are Merrill Pineau and Brian Lewis of the youth club with 11.

Since the league began Carver has been at least a minor expense to Sports Arena Manager Earl Nicholson, who has had to replace the many red lights that Carver has personally caused to burn out from over-use and has been a menace to every coach in the league. None of whom have yet been able to get adequate coverage on him and as a result none have been able to keep him from registering at least one goal on the scoresheet.

About the only team who has made a fair showing of keeping him goalless was the youth clubbers in last Thursday's contest. With Lloyd Shepherd practically tying himself to Carver, the shifty Parkdale right winger was held in check in two periods. But as most people know by now, he exploded in the third for three goals and sewed up the game for the Flyers. Shepherd can take a bow, however. Only one of the goals was scored while he was shadowing Carver.

What is the secret of Allie's success? We put this question to Allie himself the other night as Allie said "You know as well as I do boy that hockey is a team game. I've been scoring plenty of goals but I haven't been doing it by myself. I've been getting plenty of opportunities to score and most of them have come only after some hard digging on the part of my brother Skip or Dennis Gregory or after I had picked up a pass I couldn't have missed if I had been blindfolded."

NEW YORK (AP)—Jackie Robinson has signed his 1956 contract with the Brooklyn Dodgers for an estimated \$33,000, a cut from last year's salary.

E. J. (Buzz) Bavasi, Dodger vice-president, said "Jackie took a cut but it was far from the maximum 25 per cent."

Bavasi wouldn't disclose any figures. It was reliably reported Robinson, who will be 37 on Jan. 31, agreed to \$33,000, about \$4,500 less than he received for 1955.

Although the Dodgers won the pennant and finally their first world series championship, Robinson had his poorest season in nine years in the majors.

Hampered by injuries to both thighs, he played in parts of 106 games, batting .246. He hit eight homers and drove in 36 runs.

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**With Canada At Olympics**

**Skiers Gain New Respect**

CORTINA d'AMPEZZO, Italy (CP)—Canada's Olympic ski team gained new respect from European experts Tuesday after an impressive practice session on Cortina's treacherous slopes.

Peppy Lucille Wheeler of St. Jovite, Que., turned in a particularly spectacular series of practice runs.

The freckle-faced youngster celebrated her 21st birthday Jan. 14 with an eye-opening second place in the international downhill competition at Kitzbuhel, Switzerland, and Austrian coach Peppi Salvenmoser, trainer of the Canadian women's team, thinks a great deal of her chances.

"Lucille is doing the best skiing of her career and is a real contender for the giant slalom title," Salvenmoser said. "I feel confident she'll be among the first five."

The Austrian coach thinks his charges could be the surprise entry in the Olympics—both the downhill and slalom events.

"A gold medal is not impossible," he said.

FAILED IN PAST

Medals have eluded Canadian skiers in past Olympics. Tom Denning of Quebec, with a seventh place finish in the 18-kilometre race in the 1948 competition, has the best record thus far. Joanne Meverson of Montreal, eighth in the

1952 downhill at Oslo, Norway, has made the best showing in women's events.

But this year team officials are bubbling with enthusiasm.

"This is the best team we've ever sent to the Olympics," says Mrs. Pat Ramage of Montreal, manager of the skiers. "Our girls are particularly strong."

Salvenmoser said that Cortina's downhill course, which includes a large number of gates near the top of the run, is made to order for Lucille, being very similar to a giant slalom.

Waterloo Dutchmen are odds-on favorites to retain the hockey title for Canada but the speed-skating outlook is not so bright.
