It is indicated in a bulletin from the Canadian Dual Purpose Shorthorn Society. Daisy's production was 13,290 pounds milk, 542 pounds butterfat in the 305-day division. Living Proof Is Delivered

Yass Hakoshima, great Japanese pantomime, gave afternoon and evening performances at the Confederation Centre Theatre Tuesday and amazed everyone in attendance with living proof of what can be said by the human body without benefit of words.

Children at the afternoon performance especially enjoyed his "Fisher" in which he was first a fisherman hauling in his nets and then a sport fisherman going through the hilarious motions of casting (and getting the hook caught in the seat of his pants), discovering a bite, playing the fish, landing it and then trying to hold onto it.

Among the other pantomimes Hakoshima selected from his extensive repertoire were "Goshu", "Puppet", "Illusion", "Harikiri", "Dictator" and "Dream". One of the finest was "Harikiri", a tragic-comedy in which Hakoshima tries to stab himself to death but is hampered by his many changes of mind about what to say in his suicide note and the fact that he can't stand the pain of pricking himself with the knife.

Hakoshima was born and raised in Osaka, Japan, studied classical Japanese literature at Kyushu University, and was later a solo dancer at the Yokohama Ballet Company in Tokyo. He first became interested in western pantomime work in 1955, and four years later he studied pantomime under Etienne Decroux in New York where he also studied modern dance with Martha Graham and Erick Hawkins. He has given pantomime performances in many parts of the United States and Europe.

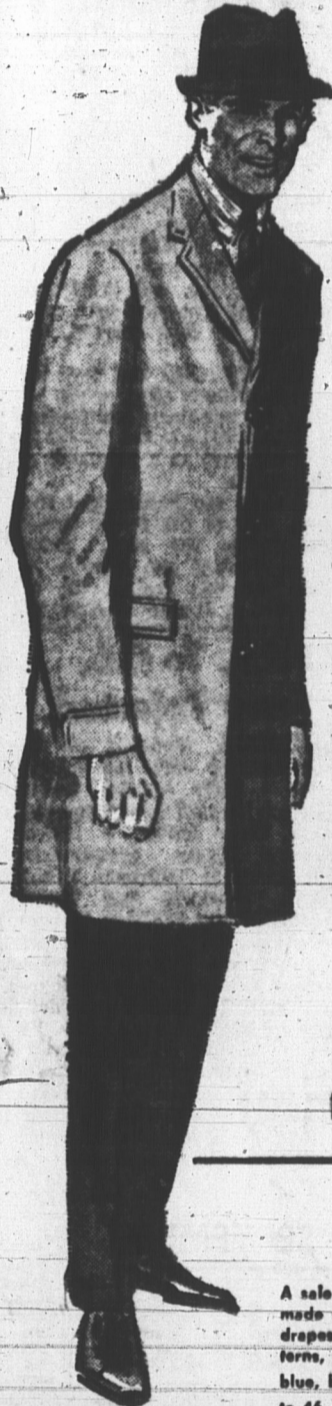
