

Haiti Has Little Stability But Every Kind Of Problem

Unhappy, hungry Haiti now in the grip of martial law, has suffered through nearly a year of bitter civil strife.

No one can predict with certainty when the end will come. But hopes are held for a return of political sanity after the results of the recent general election are announced officially on Sunday.

Brig. Gen. Antonio Kerebau, head of the three-man military junta currently in charge, has shown determination to enforce acceptance of the vote.

But seven governments have paraded across the stage of the tiny Negro republic, which has 4,000,000 folk in an area half the size of Nova Scotia, during the last nine months.

MAGLOIRE OUT FIRST
Actually Haiti, the only French-speaking republic of the Americas, has seen little stability of any kind since winning independence from the French in 1804 under the revolutionist Toussaint l'Ouverture.

The current difficulties started last December when President Paul Magloire—known in Canada which he visited while in power—was thrown from office when he tried to succeed himself in defiance of the constitution.

Kerebau was raised from an obscure military post to army chief of staff last May his appointment approved by provisional president Daniel Fignole who then headed a civilian council.

ARMY RUNS SHOW
Kerebau threw Fignole from power on the ground that he was

trying to destroy the army—a charge that was hotly denied by the outgoing president. Bitter demonstrations broke out reaching a climax June 14 when casualties were estimated at as high as 300.

All this occurred in the midst of grinding poverty in the tropical country where starvation is common even in happier times.

The army, under Kerebau's direction, has consistently sought elections, finally culminating in the vote of Sept. 22, which again was followed by disorders and shootings, resulting in martial law.

BLOODSHED FEARED
Dr. Francois Duvalier, a former health minister, claims a landslide victory, and his claims have received support from independent correspondents who have visited parts of the republic outside Port au Prince, the capital.

But another candidate, Louis Dejoie, a former senator, claims the election was rigged by the army. Haitians thus await the announcement of official results with some dread of new bloodshed.

Duvalier, 46, has already started talking like a president, however, outlining his hopes for economic progress and restoration of constitutional rights. He says that peace will finally reign in Haiti, one of the few Negro republics in the world.

Syria Received Arms From U. K. & United States

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (CP)—A United Nations report shows Britain and the United States among 1956 shippers of arms to Syria.

Both countries, in the General Assembly, have voiced concern over Soviet-bloc arms shipments to Syria—which British sources had estimated at upward of \$60,000,000 worth.

Commodity Trade Statistics for 1956, issued Saturday by the UN statistical office, reported that

during that year six Western worth of ordnance to Syria.

MACHINES OF WAR
UN statisticians use the word ordnance to mean tanks, self-propelled guns, artillery pieces, revolvers, pistols and ammunition.

The UN figures were based on reports from the exporting countries. The Soviet Union makes no such reports.

The figures showed that during 1956 Syria got \$925,000 worth of ordnance from Belgium and Luxembourg together, \$361,000 from Italy, \$41,000 from the United States, \$24,000 from Britain and \$18,000 from West Germany.

The year's total was more than double the \$358,000 Syria received from the West in 1955.

Forests May Produce More

HALIFAX (CP)—The day may come when Canada's forest grow twice as many trees three or four times as fast as they do now.

B.F. Avery of Espanola, Ont., board chairman of the Canadian Pulp and Paper Association, predicted Tuesday.

He said in an interview research experts aim to grow a hybrid poplar tree that will mature in 15 or 20 years—from 25 to 40 years earlier than present species.

They also hoped to double the number of trees grown on an acre of land. Government and university scientists were working in the same direction.

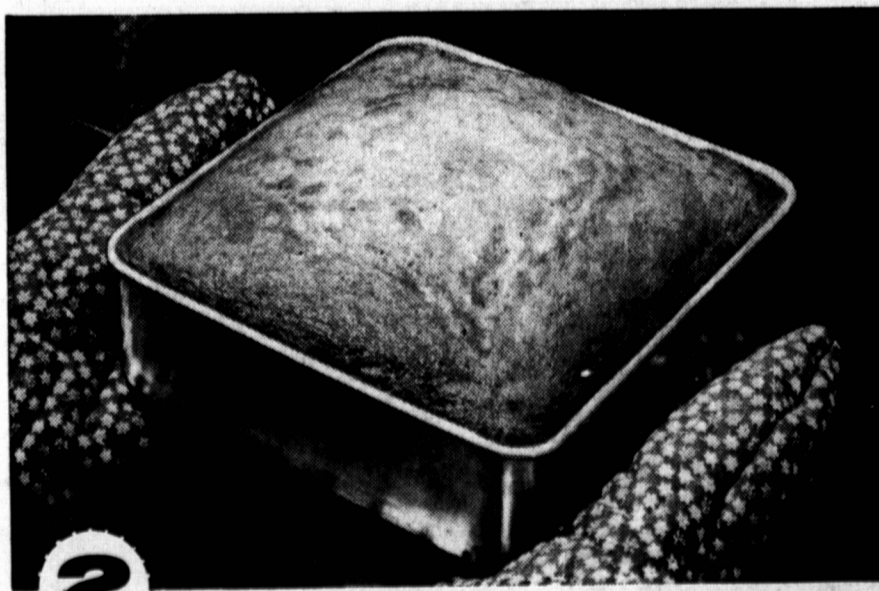

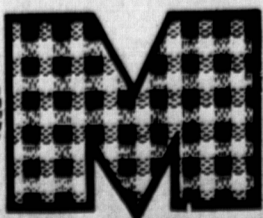
