The States and Reciprocity.

It is announced that Mr. Blaine has notified the diplomatic representatives in Washington of the several countries which have not already made reciprocity treaties with the United States...

Already reciprocal treaties have been consummated with five nations and nine others, while at this hour we are negotiating agreements of reciprocity with six other nations...

The reason the United States are in no hurry to make a treaty of reciprocity with Canada, is found in the fact that Canada is not yet ready for "conquest."
