"Do not weld your thinking to the idea that the prisoner plans cannot be changed."

One source said: "The word has gone down the line that the Communists conceivably could alter the course of action."

Gen. Thimayya, in announcing his decision Jan. 14 to turn back custody of disputed prisoners asked the two commands to hold them until a peace conference could deal with them or until the commands arrived at some new agreement.

Spanish pride has been deeply hurt. Observers in Madrid predicted that there will be demonstrations all through the country when the Queen and Duke of Edinburgh set foot on "the rock" on Spain's southernmost coast.

All Spanish workers who commute to work on Gibraltar will go on strike, they predicted.

Franco's controlled press has raised the Gibraltar issue frequently during the past year, demanding that Britain take steps to evacuate the gateway to the Mediterranean.

Last September Franco's government protested against the Queen's scheduled visit, but neither the protest nor its rejection by Britain were made public in either country.

Sources here predicted that the censorship on the latest rejection will be lifted today, along with publication of an official Spanish note or editorials violently criticizing Britain.

St. Laurent Makes

Cabinet is studying a proposed 25-per-cent pay boost for judges of provincial supreme courts and county courts.

Annual pay of provincial supreme court justices would be raised to \$18,000 from \$14,000; provincial chief justices to \$20,000 from \$16,000; and county court judges to \$10,000 from \$8,000.

First increase since legislators got a \$2,000-a-year expense allowance at the end of the Second World War. Mr. St. Laurent's prospective boosts likely will mean a jump to \$10,000 a year from a current minimum of \$6,000 for senators and MPs.

The \$2,000 allowance is tax-free for MPs; taxable for senators. Members of both Houses get a taxable indemnity of \$4,000 a year, boosted from \$2,500 in the early 1920s. This indemnity now likely will be doubled to \$8,000.

plutonium from uranium at Sellafield in Cumberland.

The two great atomic piles tested weighed some 57,000 tons each and each was topped with a 415-foot chimney. To guard against settling in soft earth, it was necessary to build a huge concrete mat, 10 feet thick and measuring 200 by 100 feet.

When work on the Windscale factory at Sellafield was initiated little was known of the chemistry of the previous plutonium. Only 20 milligrams of the metal—enough to cover the head of a pin—were available for experiments, but the fundamental processes on which the great plant now operates were worked out.

Because of the intense radioactivity from the uranium in the twin piles, the Windscale plant had to be designed so that it could operate throughout its life by remote control. The plant, encased in a thick concrete shell pierced only by measuring instruments, includes no apparatus liable to break down.

Heavy iron pipelines had to be carried two miles into the Irish sea to discharge waste material. Within 4½ years this plant was also in operation.

The third plant built to convert uranium into gas to separate the fissile isotopes from the non-fissile, was constructed at Capenhurst, Cheshire.

The book describes work now proceeding on production of electric power from the atom. An experimental atomic power station is under construction alongside the Windscale plant at Sellafield. No details of this plant are disclosed, but the possible objective of producing, within some 20 years, enough electricity to save 20,000,000 tons of coal a year is suggested.
