

Holman's Intermediates In 9-0 Victory Over M. C. A. In Exhibition

Righthander Joe Bernard, who seems to save his best games for Charlotte town teams, hurled and batted Holman's Intermediates to a 9-0 win over Maritime Central Airways in an exhibition game here yesterday afternoon.

Bernard allowed only five singles during the nine inning contest and permitted only one M.C.A. player to reach third base. He struck out six men, left seven stranded on the base paths and did not issue a free pass to first.

A veteran righthander, who was a pre-war star, Jimmy "Fiddler" MacDonald started on the mound for M.C.A. He retired the side in order in the first and second innings but gave up two runs and two hits in the third.

Left-hander Waldo Munroe relieved MacDonald in the fourth and set Holman's down without trouble until the seventh. The Summerside Intermediates came on to score seven runs in the last three innings.

Mark Delaney, former Curran and Briggs Junior star, and Joe Bernard led the assault on the M.C.A. pitchers. Delaney banged out four hits in five trips to the plate and drove in three runs. Bernard had two hits, one of them a triple, and sent four men across the plate.

Holman's picked up two runs in the third and did not score again until the seventh when they added two more. They scored twice in the eighth and three times in the ninth.

Elmer MacNeill led the M.C.A. batters with two hits, both sharp singles into right field.

Glen Matheson, M.C.A. third baseman provided the best fielding play with a great one hand stab of

Syl Bernard's liner in the ninth inning. Jimmy Grady of Holman's made a good running catch of Lorne Hennessey's fly ball in the eighth.

First Matches Today In Annual D.C.R.A. Shoot

CONNAUGHT RIFLE RANGES, South March, Ont., Aug. 10 — (CP) Shooting opens Monday in the 84th annual Dominion of Canada Rifle Association prize competition.

Almost 600 Canadians—the cream of the country's marksmen—will compete in at least two dozen matches during the next week. Shooting concludes Saturday with the final stage of the Governor-General's match, the feature event.

Adding international flavor will be a crack 14-member senior British side, the last time the senior team competed here was in 1950 when one of its members, Pte. Allan Moorhead, 54, of Middlesex took home the Governor-General's Medal.

Last year the medal was won by Harold C. Gunter, 20-year-old Saint John, N. B., cadet officer, after a four-day shoot-off.

The big prize for Canadians is a berth on the 1953 Canadian Bismley team. Top aggregate standings during the week are added to scor-

es posted in the final stage of the Governor-General's match. Out of this come the 18-man Bismley team.

Another highlight of the shoot is the King's medal won for two years by Lieut. Gilmour Boa, 27-year-old member of a Toronto family of rifle experts. Boa was a shooting member of this year's Bismley team and went on to Helsinki to represent Canada at the Olympics.

About a dozen women will compete this year on equal terms with the men.

Two grand aggregate matches—the Tilton and the Connaught—are shot the first day in addition to the 120 match. A 120 is a shooting match in which the competitor has no ranked in the first 150 in the grand aggregate for the last 10 years.

Competitors will sleep under canvas at the ranges, near Ottawa. Many marksmen, including members of the senior British team, took part last week in the four-day Ontario Rifle Association shoot at Long Branch, Ont.



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Turpin-Maxim Bout Is Off

NEW YORK, Aug. 10 — (AP) — Jack Solomon, London fight promoter, said Saturday negotiations for a fight between Randy Turpin and Joey Maxim for the world light-heavyweight title in London next month are off.

He said he will see lawyers Monday on the possibility of asking an injunction prohibiting Maxim from competing with anyone until he meets Turpin, British light-heavyweight king. Solomon said Jack (Doc) Kearns, Maxim's manager, signed an agreement for the bout before Maxim defeated Sugar Ray Robinson last month.

Solomon complained that Kearns' demands now are so high "I would have to get \$140 a seat in White City Stadium, London, to break even."

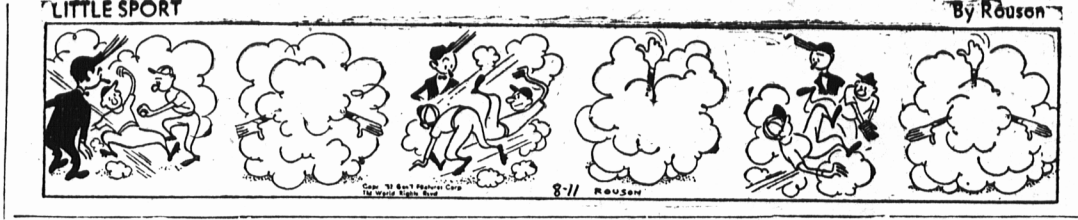
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Keen Competition At Races Here Saturday

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Elegibility List For 1952 Published

Dr. F.C. Dougan has just published his annual "Elegibility List for 1952". Therein is listed every trotter and pacer now owned or raced in the Maritimes, with the earnings and mark of each performer. Published at the Doctor's own expense, and the result of considerable work and careful compilation of records, this is a valued book to hundreds of horsemen.

It does not reach the general public because of the expense of undertaking a wide distribution. The booklet carries no supporting advertising and the total cost falls therefore, on the compiler and publisher.

Very useful too, is the summary of important United States Trotting Rules which is inter-leafed with the other subject matter in the booklet. The rules quoted are given in question and answer form, and are a ready reference, when an interpretation of track procedure is needed.

It has been said that this annual publication settles many arguments but that it also starts as many as it settles. In any event the horsemen of the Maritimes appreciate it, and realize that a lot of work goes into its production. A hundred and fifty of the books are mailed by the Doctor each year to the various stable owners and race officials in the Maritimes.

Slo-Mo-Shun IV Wins Gold Cup Over 5 Boats

SEATTLE, Aug. 10 — (CP) — Slo-Mo-Shun IV, piloted by Stanley Dollar of Seattle, won the Gold Cup Saturday in a race that saw all five of the other competing speedsters withdrawn for various mechanical reasons.

Most violent of the withdrawals was Such Crust which exploded during the first heat. Driver Bill Cantrell was burned and thrown into the water. He was fished out within seconds, taken to hospital where his condition was later reported as satisfactory.

Also forced to drop out before completion of the third and final heat were: Miss Pepsi, Miss Great Lake II, Hurricane VI and Slo-Mo-Shun V, sister ship of the winner.

Even the winning Slo-Mo IV had trouble. It failed to finish the first heat when it lost a propeller on the fifth lap of the 30-mile Lake Washington course.

On the sixth lap Slo-Mo-Shun V blew a cylinder and had to quit. Mechanics quickly switched propellers from the V to IV and Dollar was able to pilot the 1950 champion to victory.

With all of Saturday's casualties, leaving only one boat in running order, today's second Seafair Tri-Tri race over the same course was cancelled.

Of the boats which failed to finish Saturday, Miss Pepsi had the consolation of having set a 30-mile speed record of 101.024 miles an hour in the opening heat

U. S. Team Wins Davis Cup Series From Canadians

MONTRÉAL, Aug. 10 — (CP) — Rain today postponed concluding singles matches of the final round of the North American zone Davis Cup tennis tie between Canada and the United States. The Americans yesterday won the best-of-five series, defeating Canada in doubles, after winning the opening singles matches Friday.

Brendan Macken is scheduled to meet Bob Perry of the U.S. tomorrow while his fellow Davis Cup veteran, Henri Rochon, will take on Vic Seixas, American playing-captain. Play starts at 2:30 P.M. EDT at the MMount Royal Tennis Club.

The American doubles team of Seixas and Herb Flum yesterday defeated Macken and Lorne Main 6-3, 3-6, 6-4, 6-4. Flum and Rochon 6-2, 6-3, 6-2 and Seixas defeated Main 6-2, 6-3, 6-4 in singles Friday.

The outcome of tomorrow's matches cannot affect the result. The United States next takes on the winner of an Italy-India series for the right to challenge Australia, present holders of the Davis Cup.

The doubles match was a heart-breaker for the Canadians to drop. They put on one of the best demonstrations of tennis seen in Canada for a long time, and lost mainly because they lacked a really powerful serve.

N. S. Tennis Tournament Is Completed

DARTMOUTH, N.S., Aug. 10 — (CP) — Anne Stacey, Halifax, set a record for Nova Scotia tennis Saturday when she won the ladies singles title by beating Mrs. Gordon Hughes, Windsor, 6-4, 6-2.

Miss Stacey just two weeks ago won the provincial junior ladies singles crown and thus is the first player in the province to ever hold both the junior and senior singles crowns.

Three other champions were declared Saturday and R. Bedard of Sherbrooke, Que., and Vida Large, Halifax, won the mixed doubles Sunday with a 6-4, 6-3 win over Mr. and Mrs. Gordon Hughes of Windsor.

Bedard also captured the men's singles title. Frank Nolan, Halifax, and Fred Fennell, Montreal, won the men's doubles title and Mrs. Hughes, and Miss Large, took the women's doubles crown.

Marlene Stewart Retains Women's Close Golf Crown

EDMONTON, Aug. 10 — (CP) — Marlene Stewart, 18-year-old defending champion from Lookout Point Club at Fonthill, Ont., chopped down an elusive par and smashed a four-year-old record Saturday to retain the Canadian women's close golf championship with a 54-hole medal score of 229.

Her score was eight strokes under ladies' par at the 6,555-yard Edmonton Mayfair course and 12 strokes better than the old record of 241, set in 1949 when the tournament switched from match to medal play.

Marlene won the crown last year at Laval-Sur-Le-Lac, Que., and this year's victory made her the second person to cop it twice in a row. Ada Mackenzie of Toronto accomplished the feat twice.

The young champion's 72-78-79-229 pace over the par 79 Mayfair gave her a 15-stroke margin over second-place Ontario champion Mary Gay of Kitchener, who fell apart Saturday and came in with 77-76-91-244.
