Red Cross Services Outlined By Speaker

A highlight of the annual Red Cross Swimming and Water Safety Banquet held last evening in the Charlottetown YMCA was a speech delivered by Major General A. E. Winch, national commissioner of the Canadian Red Cross, Gen. Winch was introduced by Gordon MacDonald, president of the P.E.I. Red Cross Society, who outlined some of Gen. Winch's war experiences. Gen. Winch elaborated on the many and varied services of the Canadian Red Cross Society and explained the ways and means of running such a vast organization. Over \$2,500,000 are required yearly by the Red Cross to carry out its program, and this money is raised through campaigns and donations from the citizens of Canada, he said. Analyses are made of Prince County fisheries and the development possibilities based on fishery potentials in the Gulf of St. Lawrence. Main recommendations in regard to fisheries are that a development program with emphasis on education of fishermen be planned together with a long-range investment program for development of offshore fisheries with attendant better possibilities for year-round employment. Technical and economic data for more important harbors is compiled and the influence on a fishery development from trends within fishery and export shipping has been considered.

Mail, banking and telecommunication systems are described and outlines of probable future development of mail distribution systems and results of further automation of the telecommunication system are discussed.

POWER SITUATION

The electric power situation in the province is discussed in connection with the necessity for an all-weather highway to West Prince if railway service is abandoned. Zoning plans have been made for the more important centres in Prince County and a brief general introduction to the problems connected with zoning is given as well as a short description of the zoning plans. Statistical data about towns and villages in Prince County is attached, for the purpose of future planning.

OUTLINE MAIN FACTORS

Company vice-president Mr. Folkesson, said "It has not been possible in this report to consider in detail all matters of regional importance. We have, however, given a brief outline of the main factors influencing the physical development. We have tried to concentrate our work to fields of prime importance in future planning; for example, population development, the major regional problems which will need solution in the immediate future and technical problems."

Copies of the Prince County report are to be made available for town councils, village commissioners and resources development groups.
