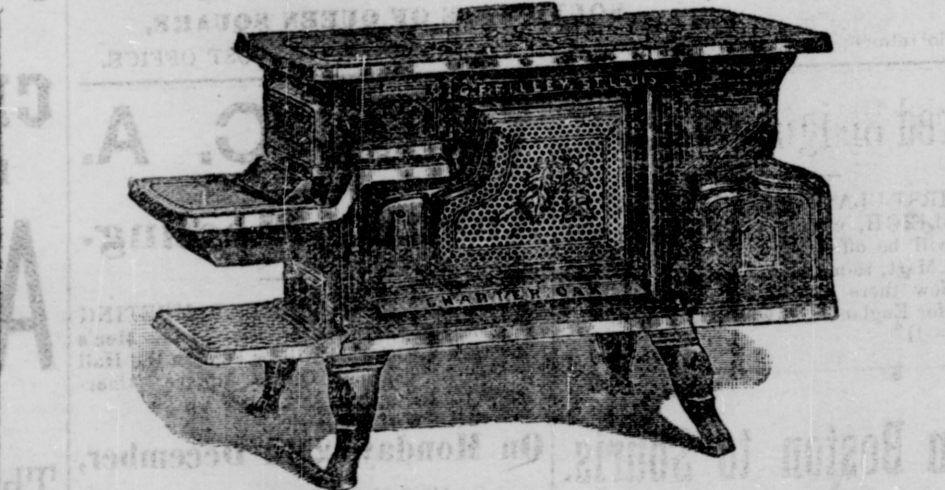

News Notes.

Black diphtheria has appeared in Corn-
wall, Ont.

Spotted fever is raging at Fairfield,
Texas. Business is almost suspended.

A newly-opened gold mine at Whiteburn,
Queen's County, N. S., is yielding six oz.
of gold per ton of quartz.

The Veterinary Society of Paris has re-
solved to treat a number of animals by the
Koch system of inoculation, and to tabulate
the results.

Mr. Balfour, Chief Secretary for Ireland,
will visit Ulster in January for the purpose
of making a series of addresses to the
masses. It is presumed that his main
efforts will be directed upon the city of
Belfast.

A Scotch syndicate is reported to have
secured control of five oatmeal mills in the
vicinity of Cedar Rapids, Iowa, and it is
said the syndicate is bent on getting con-
trol of all the oatmeal mills in the United
States.

Wolves, rabbits and gophers are causing
much havoc in Kansas, and extraordinary
bounties are being offered by the govern-
ment for scalps of the animals. The de-
struction has been so great as to impoverish
the settlers.

A Brussels despatch says the Congo tech-
nical commission has formally agreed that
the United States shall have the same
rights as other powers in the Congo State,
although the United States Government
did not ratify the Berlin Act.

John M. Young, son of the late Brigham
Young, has concluded an agreement with
B. C. Faurot, a banker of Lima, Ohio,
whereby he comes into possession of three
million acres of land in northern New
Mexico, which he intends to settle with
1,000 Utah Mormons.

SUCCI'S GREAT FAST.—Signor Succi has
just ended a forty five days fast in New York.
He swallowed nothing but water and ice and
a few drops of a narcotic preparation for
lessening the pangs of hunger. He lost
forty pounds in weight. He endured the fast
just for the purpose of showing that it could
be done. A few hours after Succi completed
his fast he partook of some cocoa, and the
effect it had upon his system nearly deprived
him of life. His stomach was very weak and
it required all the ability of his doctor to
save him. When he recovered from this
attack he had his first meal, for forty-five
days, in the presence of a large audience.
He is said to be terribly emaciated in ap-
pearance, but his strong will held him up all
through the fast.
