termed non-essentials.
However, in large areas of this world, food is rarely available in a satisfying quantity and indeed the history of the human race may well be said to be the story of a hungry animal in search of food.
Our large cities take it for granted that food should be available but might well do some serious thinking on the point that it may not always be so and give consideration to the fact that unless the production of food is sufficiently attractive as a way of life compared with other occupations that a very serious lack of balance can develop in the number of people living in cities and the number left on the farms to provide the prime essentials of life.
Electric Power
The labor saving possibilities of electric power were forcibly brought to us recently when we saw in operation a home-made device powered by a three-quarter horse power motor for unloading chopped grass from wagons into a forage blower.
A three-ton load was moved steadily out of a 14-foot wagon in eight minutes, the only hand labor required being a man to see that the chopped material moved into the blower at a uniform rate.
As power becomes more widely available, the ingenuity of farmers will put it to more and more labor saving uses and production methods will become less laborious and more efficient.
Milk Production Costs
The Manitoba Department of Agriculture has been conducting a survey on the cost of milk production for fluid purposes on 56 farms and has released figures covering the period June 1, 1951 to May 31, 1952.

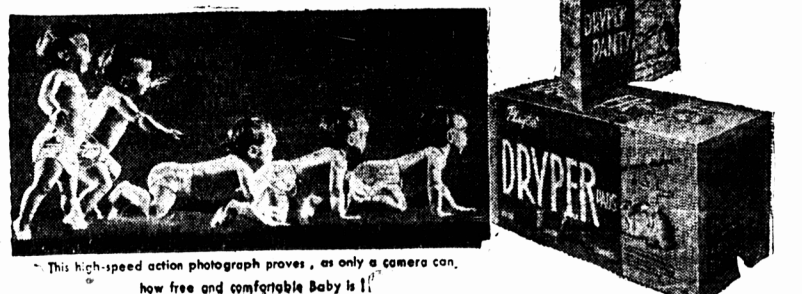
